Albany, Or., March 8.—For the first time in 13 years Linn county, in which Albany is located, is to be the scene of a murder trial. Charles J. Powell, a farmer living near Albany, is the defendant.

THIS MAN SAYS THAT ROOSEVELT HAS SHRUNK

Detroit, Mich., March 8.—"Theodore Roosevelt, President of the United States," and just "Colonel Theodore Roosevelt" are two distinct persons, in the eyes of Archibald G. Ellair, a wealthy stock broker of this city today, as far as relates to the amount of consideration to which the aforesaid Roosevelt is entitled.

A few days ago Ellair engaged quarters aboard a Hamburg-American liner bound for the Mediterranean. It was later discovered that the quarters adjoined those of former President Roosevelt and those who will accompany him on his African trip.

For this reason the Hamburg-American officials endeavored to persuade Ellair to relinquish his right to his state room and persuading him to accept other accommodation. This the Detroit man declined to do, holding that Roosevelt is now a plain American citizen and entitled to no more than the usual courtesies.

WALTER F. SCHULTZ KILLED BY THUGS

Washington, D. C., March 8.—Following the partial identification of a body believed to be that of Walter F. Schultz, an artist, of Chicago, the police today are endeavoring to ascertain the identity of his murderers. Schultz was a visitor to the Taft inauguration, and had been traveling for his health. How he came to be found with his throat cut in a vacant lot in Alexandria is the puzzle detectives are trying to solve.

When found the body was partially covered with snow. In one of the pockets was a draft for \$300 and a letter signed "Your Sister, Ellen Dorothy." There was a card of Mrs. Alma H. Gillette, of Sioux City, Iowa.

The police learned from Sioux City that a Mrs. Gillette there is a sister of Schultz. Her husband telegraphed the police here to conduct an investigation.
