CANNING ASSOCIATION WANTS A SETTLEMENT

A complaint has been filed in the circuit court, department No. 2, by the Woodburn Canning Association against E. E. Boster and M. L. Barnett, asking the court to enjoin them from disposing of funds alleged to have been collected as contributions toward the erecting of the canning establishment. The complaint states that Boster took the contract to solicit \$5000 or more to be used in the establishment of the Woodburn Canning Association, and after collecting this amount and \$150 over, no more has been heard of the matter. The canning company, in their complaint, also alleges that the defendants are intending to convert the moneys in question to their own personal use, and will do so if not interfered with by law. It is asked that the defendants be enjoined from using any of the solicited money, and that they be compelled to arrange a proper settlement. John Bayne is appearing as counsel for the plaintiffs.

Opens Navy Yards.

Washington, D. C., March 8.—A recent order of former Secretary of the Navy Newberry, closing the navy yards at New Orleans and Pensacola, was revoked today by Secretary Meyer; his first official act as secretary of the navy.

Meyer acted upon the representations of the senators from Louisiana and Florida. He wired for further information, and will give a final decision in the matter later.
