DISASTROUS STORM IN NEW MEXICO

(United Press Special Wire.) Albuquerque, N. M., March 11.—One American and five Mexicans dead, and a number of other fatalities are believed to have resulted from the storm which is sweeping the southwest today, according to reports received here.

An unidentified American was found frozen to death near Lake Pecos. Several sheep herders were lost at the Horn several days ago and all hope of their having escaped the terrible blizzard, which has been raging throughout the territory, has been abandoned. Several other persons are missing and are believed to be dead.

The storm is general throughout the territory and covers most of the southwest. Reports, which are coming in slowly owing to the terrible conditions caused by the storm, tell of heavy property damage.

Information received from Roswell today is to the effect that an army building there was torn down by the storm yesterday and that several other buildings were wrecked. Damage here is heavy and will amount to more than \$200,000, according to an estimate made by the city engineer.

THE LESS CLOTHES THE MORE MORALITY

(United Press Special Wire.) New York, March 11.—Lack of clothes makes morality according to the theory of Arthur George Pennington Collier, son of the retired English officer, Lieutenant General Sir Edwin Collier, for forty years a resident of British East Africa.

"If American women were less clothes they would be more modest," declared the Englishman today. "The women of Africa wear very little and they are the most moral women in the world."

"Clothes make the savage wilder and more wicked. I have noticed that in the native parts, which consist of a strip of bark or bit of woven blanket, they are as innocuous as their charms as children."

MORSE WILL GET OUT OF MEXICAN PRISON

(United Press Special Wire.) San Diego, Cal., March 11.—William G. Morse, son of the inventor of telegraphy, will be released from prison tomorrow, according to reports received here from Escondido, Lower California, today. Morse has been in jail at Escondido since last December, when he shot and killed an Indian camp attendant, who had snatched him.

Morse sent word to friends here that the Mexican officials had treated him with great consideration, and that he made him as comfortable as possible under the circumstances. A strict investigation of Morse's case has been made since his incarceration, and according to the report the officials have decided to dismiss the murder charge, which has been pending against him.

RANCHER LOST FORTUNE ON FAKE HORSE RACE

(United Press Special Wire.) Los Angeles, March 11.—Accused of swindling W. G. Mitchell, a wealthy rancher of Sprague, Wash., out of \$10,000 by a fake horse race, James D. Ward, also known as J. D. Griswold, is under arrest here today. The police believe the prisoner is wanted in Seattle, Denver and in various parts of Arkansas on similar charges. According to the information in the hands of the police, Mitchell was induced to bet his money on a two-horse "pasture race" near Arcadia Monday evening. The horse on which the rancher placed his money stumbled near the finish. The jockey fell and was apparently badly hurt. Blood which covered his face is now said to have been red ink.

Frightened by the boy's seeming pain, Mitchell consented to allow the stakeholder to "run for a doctor." He failed to return.
