SURGICAL SCIENCE AGAIN COMES TO THE FRONT-- AND MAKES THE DUMB SPEAK BY DELICATE OPERATION

Palo Alto, Cal., March 12.—After lying speechless for five weeks, his vocal organs completely paralyzed because of an injury to his skull, little Foss Coons, the son of a prominent resident here, was given his voice again this morning by a miraculous surgical operation. His mother, who has waited by his bedside since the accident, swooned when she heard her son speak to her again.
More than a month ago the lad while at play, fell from a high bal-

cony and sustained a fracture of the skull. He was unconscious for several days, and when he regained his senses it was found that he had been bereft of his voice. Specialists held out little hope for him.
Hoping against hope that the boy might survive, the surgeon today took a great chance. He found a tiny bead of bone pressing upon one of the vital portions of the child's brain. With infinite care he removed the irritant. In a flash the boy's voice came back to him. He will recover.

EVIDENTLY DODGING EARTHQUAKE CENTERS

Cleveland, O., March 12.—The order of Jesuits today began a worldwide movement for the study of earthquakes. The organization of the movement is in charge of Rev. Frederick Odenbach, of St. Ignatius College, in this city.

Father Odenbach, who invented the electric seismograph, explained that stations will be established in more than 12 Jesuit colleges in the United States and Canada, and that a system of absolute comparability between seismographs will be initiated.

Among the stations to be located are ones at St. Boniface, Man.; Denver, Colo.; Spokane, Wash., and Havana, Cuba.
