**SEATTLE AWAKE; PORTLAND ASLEEP**

 Seattle, March 16.—Official announcement of a new schedule to be inaugurated shortly by the Pacific Coast Steamship Company was made here today. Under the new plan the fast steamers President and Governor are to be used in an express service between Seattle and Southern California ports, while the smaller steamers City of Puebla and Queen are to ply between Puget sound and San Francisco. The arrangement will bring the steamer President into commission after being idle during the winter. It is expected she will first go south from San Francisco as she is scheduled to sail from Seattle April 16.

By the new schedule the President and Governor depart from Seattle on Friday mornings and are due to arrive at San Francisco Sunday afternoon. Leaving San Francisco Monday

the express steamers will arrive at San Diego on Wednesday afternoon, touching at Los Angeles ports.

**SHE AWOKE RATHER THAN BURN TO DEATH**

 Astoria, March 16.—While Miss M. Dobbs, a teacher in a local school, is in terrible agony today, she has one thing to be thankful for—that she was not burned to death in a fire that started in her bed in the Irving hotel by an electric heating iron. After placing the iron under the bed-clothes to keep her warm last night, Miss Dobbs fell asleep. Not until she had been severely burned did she open her eyes to find herself in the midst of flames that were consuming the bed-clothes. The young woman gave the alarm, extinguished the flames that had attacked her night gown and then swooned. While the blaze was being extinguished by attaches of the hotel Miss Dobbs was carried to another room where she was placed under the care of a physician. Had she remained asleep a few seconds longer she might have been fatally burned.

**WELCH FRANCHISE TO BE EXTENDED**

On request of counsel for the Welch corporation at Portland, for extension of the franchise in this city for the Salem, Eugene & Eastern railroad, the city fathers ordered the city attorney to draft a new franchise ordinance, and require the two miles of road to be built inside of 90 days, and the bond increased to \$7000. Mr. Hardy said the corporation had been hit pretty hard by the panic, but, in spite of that, had spent \$250,000 at Albany, Eugene and Springfield, where they had street cars running and were building lines. **MR. HAYES EXPLAINS WHY HE WAS BEATEN**

 New York, March 16.—Commenting on his defeat by Dorando Pietri in the Marathon race last night at Madison Square Garden, John D. Hayes, winner of the Olympic marathon distance race in England, said today:

"The next time I will run my own race, not Dorando's. My condition was good at the start, but the clip was too fast for me. Had I followed my own judgment I believe a different story of the result would be told."

It was learned today that Hayes ran a race which had been set for him by his trainers according to a prearranged schedule. Hayes was defeated before a crowd of 10,000 persons, a great number being admirers of Dorando. The course was over the regular distance of 26 miles 285 yards, 10 laps to the mile. Dorando won by half a mile in 2 hours, 48 minutes, 8 seconds.
