

TWIN BROTHER SPRINGS SENSATION

San Francisco, March 16.—When Patrolman William H. Helms, of the local police force, was shot down on the Embarcadero, a vicious quarter of the city, last June, two twin brothers, James O. Young and Thomas O. Young, were pursued and captured. Thomas was charged with murdering Helms and his brother held as principal witness and accessory. These facts led to one of the most peculiar criminal cases today in the history of San Francisco murder trials.

Thomas Young was brought to trial, but the jury disagreed. He was again placed on trial recently. A procession of witnesses to the shooting, its prelude and its aftermath, took the stand and swore positively to various phases of the tragedy, all tending to prove that Thomas O. Young was Helms' murderer.

As far as may be judged of the case before the jury decides, Thomas Young stood convicted by the evidence.

Without warning, James Young, apparently foreseeing the conviction of his brother, arose in court late yesterday afternoon, and declared that he, and not his living likeness, fired the fatal shot.

Before the surprised counsel for

the state could object Young told of his brother's pursuit by Helms and of the officer's firing. He said he saw his brother fall, and the policeman kick the prostrate form. "I couldn't stand that," said Young quietly, "and I let him have it."

According to prominent lawyers, Young's story cannot be contradicted by the testimony of the witnesses who have sworn positively that Thomas Young fired the fatal shot. The defendant has always sworn that he fell to the ground and was dazed heard a shot and saw Helms fall. The uniform of the dead officer bears no powder marks. This is a weak spot in the prosecution's case, because it alleges that the prostrate man shot Helms as he was bending over him. James Young declares he fired the shot from a considerable distance. To refute this the prosecution has a statement signed by James Young, on the night of the shooting, charging the defendant on trial with the crime.

The prosecution declared today that Young's confession cannot be considered, but attorneys say that a jury cannot be expected to convict a man of a crime when another openly confesses to its commission.

Curtis, who is young, has been fielding faster and hitting better than ever, may be missed.

Danny Long is bidden to "cheer up; the worst may be yet to come," for it is rumored that there are more gold pieces in the vaults of Devereaux and that other Seals are contemplating a transformation into fogs. Long has been compelled to dig down and serve a little more salary to several threatening jumpers. It is said, in order to prevent this.

SENATOR ABRAHAM IS A CANDIDATE

HARRIMAN WILL NOT BUILD THE ROAD

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Marshfield, Or., March 16.—E. H. Harriman's demand for an absolute guarantee of immediate returns from his investment before he will spend a nickel on the long promised Coos Bay line has been reiterated with fresh and more burdensome conditions. In a telegram recently received by Dr. J. T. McCormick, president of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, the railroad king declares that the line will not be built until he receives a guarantee "properly secured," that the receipts of the road will be equal to the cost of maintenance, operation and tax, as well as the 4 per cent return upon cost of the line originally demanded. Furthermore, Mr. Harriman now insists that the deficit in any one year shall be paid immediately and ample security must be given to insure such payment.

It is pointed out that there is no legal way in which a city or county could give the required guaranty and it could only be done by personal obligations by a few men of large means. If a deficit occurred they would be obliged to make it good without and prospect of repayment from Harriman if the road ultimately became a money-maker.

Harriman's ultimatum is contained in a telegram sent by him in response to one from the Chambers of Commerce of Marshfield and North Bend.

The position which is now taken by Harriman, it is said, is distinctly different from that indicated in his dispatch to Governor Chamberlain February 23, 1909, when he said: "I told the delegation from Coos Bay that I would recommend construction of the road to that point if they could satisfy us that it would return 4 per cent on cost or have that amount guaranteed each year for a term of years. This still holds good to you or them."

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS.

The supreme court handed down the following opinions today:

State of Oregon, respondent, vs. William Elson, appellant, appeal from the circuit court of Multnomah county. Thomas O'Day, judge; petition for rehearing denied; decisions by Judge King.

Richard Martin, Jr., respondent, vs. Martin White et al., appellants, appeal from the circuit court of Columbia county. Thomas A. McBride, judge; opinion of the lower court affirmed by Justice Eakin.

State of Oregon, respondent, vs. J. D. Dunn, appellant, appeal from the circuit court of Multnomah county. C. U. Gantenbein, judge; petition for rehearing denied on decision by Justice King.

Albert N. Johnson, appellant, vs. Crook county, respondent, appeal from the circuit court of Crook county. W. L. Bradshaw, judge. Opinion of lower court affirmed by Chief Justice Moore. This was an action to recover taxes alleged to have been paid under compulsion. Chief Justice Moore held that no evidence was introduced at the bar trial to show that the tax was void, or if so, it was paid under such circumstances as to authorize a recovery thereof.

DEMOCRATS JUMP ONTO FITZGERALD

Washington, March 16.—Representative J. J. THE PAYNE TARIFF BILL CAUSES MUCH PAIN

Washington, March 16.—The Payne tariff bill, which will be introduced in congress late today or tomorrow, is said positively to contain the following provisions:

No tax will be imposed on coffee. Lumber will be reduced from \$2 to \$1 per thousand.

There will be free hides and lower schedules on shoes and leather goods. Steel will be materially reduced— one-half on the bigger articles.

The duties on sugar are undisturbed and concessions are granted Cuba and the Philippines.

The wool schedule will be aimed at the amount of secured wool in the fleece.

KILLING NORMAL SCHOOLS

LEGISLATURE GOES ON RECORD

The fight on the state normal schools grew more bitter as the first day's session of the legislature proceeded. The senate ways and means committee was formally requested by a member of the board of regents to permit a hearing on behalf of the delegates from Jackson, Umatilla and Polk counties, but this was denied by Mr. Nottingham, who said the senate was in no temper to hear anything about the normal schools. The editor of the Portland Oregonian, present in person, kept a vigilant tab on the situation, and flew back and forth between the two houses, lest any advantage be taken to keep the schools alive. A vicious editorial in the Oregonian today refers to the normals as village schools that have never supplied the state with any teachers.
