PAYNE TARIFF BILL

(Continued from page 1.)

maining paragraphs of the bill, not in this statement, are rated substantially the same as under the present law.

A section is added to the old law, applying the same rules to patents obtained in the United States by an alien as are adopted by the country of which the alien is a citizen, in respect to patents issued there to citizens of the United States.

A section is inserted preserving Cuban reciprocity with the provisions of the present law.

A provision is made for the termination of the various commercial agreements with foreign countries, according to the terms of the agreement, by proper notice.

The bill applies a tax for transfers of property, both real and personal, by inheritance or succession, or by will. It is believed that this provision, when in full operation, will bring in revenue amounting to \$20,000,000.

The internal revenue tax on cigarettes is increased. The duty on those weighing over three pounds per thousand is raised from \$3 to \$3.50, and those weighing less than that is raised from \$1 to \$1.50.

The bill contains a section extending the privileges of "drawback" on material imported into the country on which tariff has been paid and the products of which when manufactured here are exported.

The reduction of 50 per cent on the duty on lumber will work greatly to the advantage of Canadian lumbermen. It is said, and was opposed by the interests of the great northwest timber belts.

Increases made by the bill include the tariff on perfumery and toilet articles, which is raised 50 to 60 per cent ad valorem. On fancy soaps the tax is raised from 15 to 20 cents a pound.

Dandelion root articles, used as a substitute for coffee, is increased from 2 1/2 to 4 cents a pound.

Unground mustard is taken from the free list, and a tax of 30 per cent ad valorem is fixed.

Feathers are raised from 15 to 20 per cent ad valorem.

The tax on furs is raised from 20 to 27 1/2 per cent ad valorem.

The duties on the following articles are increased because the committee has found that they have not sufficient protection now:

Cement, from 30 to 35 per cent ad valorem.

Asphaltum to 1500th of a cent per pound on the bitumen contained therein.

Watch movements having over seven jewels to 70 cents each; those having 11 to 15 jewels to \$1.85. Those having more than 17 jewels, unchanged.

Watch cases and parts of watches and clocks are unchanged.

Zinc in ore, now brought in at 30 per cent ad valorem, is raised to one cent per pound for the zinc contained therein.

Split peas are raised from 40 to 45 cents a bushel.

Lemons are raised from one cent to 1 1/2 cent per pound.

Pineapples from \$7 per thousand to \$8 per thousand.

Women's gloves are advanced to the rate on men's gloves, \$4 per dozen, and women's gloves are assessed in addition 35 cents per dozen, to be paid for each inch over 14 inches in length.

Reductions are applied to about 50 per cent of such articles as chemicals, oils and paints and the amounts of the decrease range from 25 to 50 per cent.

On the 17th of March last year the rink proprietors gave a similar masquerade, which was conceded to be a great success and a large crowd of merry-makers are expected to attend tonight.
