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SALEM IS GETTING MOUNTAIN WATER.

Every step is being taken by the Capital Water Commission to bring mountain water into Salem this summer.

Engineer Culver, who was employed by the city to make a preliminary survey HAS HIS WORK NEARLY DONE.

The survey will include estimates on a line to the Little North Fork and also to the Breitenbush, which is ten miles farther.

The Commission will probably take water first from the Little North Fork, AND WHEN THAT REGION SETTLES UP GO ON TO THE BREITENBUSH.

But these are matters of detail for the Commission to work up, and will be decided in due time.

THE COMMISSION IS LARGE ENOUGH AND COMPOSED OF MEN OF SOLID CHARACTER, so that all interests will be given a hearing and the right thing will be done for the city and the state.

SENATOR ABRAHAM FOR GOVERNOR.

State Senator Abraham has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for Governor.

He was one of the most aggressive reform leaders in the Senate, and took strong positions on live questions, LIKE LABOR, SUNDAY LAWS, ETC.

The temptation for men whose names are up at the head of the list alphabetically to run for office is pretty strong.

But Senator Abraham has more to his candidacy than that, and will be found TO HAVE A STRONG FOLLOWING.

He says it will make no difference with him whether Governor Benson is a candidate again or not, but he is over-sanguine in that.

Republicans feel pretty good over Governor Benson as far as he has gone and MAY ASK HIM TO CONTINUE AT THE HELM.

Besides, Ackerman's name begins with "A," and he has a pretty large personal following and Republicans may turn to him.

Then there is not so much in the alphabetical advantage, because Withycombe, who was last on the list, was the nominee in 1906.
