SENDING IN ROCK FOR STREET PAVING

In spite of the fact that the South Commercial street bridge is in such a shape the car traffic has been abandoned, the contracting company, under the supervision of Jack Smart, is dumping the crushed rock for the first layer on the streets to be paved. The rock is being hauled from the rock quarry south of the city by wagon and team, and unloaded at the intersection of Liberty and State streets, at which intersection the paving will probably be started. Manager Smart has men working in the quarry every day, and there has been enough rock unearthed to lay the first surface for four blocks of paved streets. As soon as the bridge builders have completed the construction of the street car portion, the dump cars will be put into commission, and paving will be started at once.

TOOK THE CARBOLIC ACID THROUGH TRAIN

 Vancouver, Wash., March 22.—With only a fighting chance for his life left, James Murphy, 39 years old, and an electrician of Seattle, lies in a hospital here today with his mouth and throat terribly burned by an ounce of pure carbolic acid, which he swallowed yesterday because he had been jilted.

The young man came here from Portland to end his life. Shortly after he was assigned to a room in the St. Elmo hotel a telephone call for him was received. The proprietor forced his way into the room, when loud rapping failed to bring a response, and found Murphy lying on the floor in convulsions. After regaining consciousness Murphy asked for a pencil and wrote:
