The April "Everybody's."

"When today died, an epoch ended." Inter it in the crypt with Alexander's, with Caesar's, with Napoleon's." Thomas W. Lawson writes, in the April Everybody's, a characteristically stirring appreciation of Theodore Roosevelt under the title, "The Passing of the Man;" and the editors add to this a brief review of the ex-President's career as public servant and citizen, and a godspeed to the new chief executive.

The third shot, and perhaps the most effective from a practical standpoint, in the campaign against margin gambling, is fired in "The Game Gets You," by John Parr; and added to it is the confession of a branch manager of one of New York's big stock exchange houses. It is called "A Hiredling of Wall Street."

No less timely is "Alcoholism: Its Cause and Its Arrest," by the Rev. Samuel McComb—an outline of the methods used by the Emmanuel church in combating this widespread evil.

F. Alexander Powell writes interestingly of the life of the Ottoman woman in "Prisons of the Harem." Hartley Davis explains the slum's penetration into modern plays; and in the closing chapter of "The Woman's Invasion" William Hard and Rheta Childe Dorr consider the effect of woman's work after marriage upon the home and family life.

Fiction is evenly distributed. Emily Post's charmingly descriptive story, "The Title Market," goes into its third installment; Forrest Crissey and Harrison L. Beach collaborate in "The Whipped Man," a powerful story of the Night Riders in the tobacco war of Kentucky; Harrison Rhodes and Ellis Parker Butler hold up the humorous side in "Justice to William Riggs" and "The Late John Wiggins;" Johnson Morton contributes "Waiting;" and childish emotions in "A Little Daughter of Eve."

"Little stories of Real life" there are by Paul West and Edith Wyatt. And the department devoted to book reviews, anecdotes and publishers' editorials are continued as usual.
