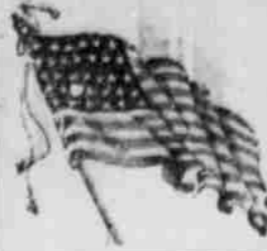

**DEALING WITH THE COLLEGE HAZING EVIL.**

Woodburn Grange resolutions published in this paper hit the hazing abuses at colleges right between the eyes.

Neither the students nor the faculties of our colleges and universities **SEEM CAPABLE OF DEALING WITH THE PROBLEM.**

It should be made the duty of the district attorneys to deal with it, if it is not already their duty according to law. What right have college students to commit outrages on the person of other students **ANY MORE THAN ANY OTHER CRIMINALLY INCLINED INDIVIDUAL?**

None whatever, and hence they have no right to enjoy immunity from the punishment provided by law for such offenses.

Let the laws be enforced against those enjoying the highest privileges of society, **AS WELL AS AGAINST THE POOR AND UNFORTUNATE.**

The authorities should expel students found guilty of hazing and forever forbid them entering a state-aided college.

The student at the Oregon Agricultural College who drew a butcher knife and also threatened to shoot hazers was in the right.

He asserted the unwritten law of self-defense against cowardly assailants, who **IN THE NAME OF FUN AND COLLEGE SPIRIT COMMIT OUTRAGES.**

That put an end to the practice at Corvallis that was fast degenerating into criminality that is a discredit to alleged seats of learning.

Only Monday the telegraph brought the news of hazing to death of Charles Stinson at Minneapolis, **A STUDENT TIED UP TO A TREE BY THE HEELS.**

**IS THAT ANY LESS THAN KIDNAPING OR MURDER?** It is said at the end of the telegram that it is expected that arrests will follow, but they never do, as everybody seems afraid to incur the ill will of alleged college spirit.

It is to be hoped the grange generally will take up this matter.


