DEMONSTRATION TRAIN'S GOOD WORK

Agitation is the beginning of progress. The effort of the demonstration train, moving this week from point to point through Southern Oregon, is to spread the gospel of better methods on the soil. It is the truth told in a new way. Scientists from the Oregon Agricultural College are with the train as agitators for improved farming methods. On their train are perfected types of cows illustrative of the most profitable breeds. There, also, is an Oregon hen that has broken the world's record by laying 256 eggs in a year. In every branch of agricultural husbandry, there are with the train, exhibits exemplifying the advances made and making. These are supplemented with addresses and literature by the college experts. It is literally the carrying of the college to the farmer on his farm, instead of waiting for the farmer to attend the college. It is the actual delivery of education, postpaid almost at the very doors of town and country homes.

Its novelty is a part of its value in that the very novelty itself will bring within the educative influence many whose attention could not otherwise be secured. The better types of animals and poultry, various exhibits illustrative of advanced agriculture and the addresses of the experts are the state fair and the agricultural college joined together under one canvass, and shown to the farmer at his own doorstep. It is an example of that agitation that always has been and always will be the handmaid of evolution. When all other influences have failed, the demonstration train will do its part in setting in motion forces that will interest, arouse and educate.

This country is to be called upon within a comparatively few years to feed a 200,000,000 population of its own. It cannot do it with its present wheat yield of only about 12 bushels per acre. It must increase its yield, or face a deficit and become an importer. That the average yield can be increased is known to be possible, for England has raised hers from eight and ten to 29 and 30 bushels per acre. France has made a similar increase, and Holland has forced hers up to 42. To do this, to carry the message of better methods, to place in the hands of the man on the soil all known things that will aid him and to spread the gospel of bettered country homes is the mission of the Southern Oregon demonstration train, and of a similar one passing through Southern Washington with Washington state college experts.—Portland Journal.
