**Old Bridge Was Rotten**—  
The bridge builders who have been working on the South Commercial street bridge, have met with some difficulty in driving the piles owing to the old structure being so frail. Several times the workmen were compelled to rebuild some of the lower stanchions of the bridge, in order to assure the safety of the pile driver when taken over the bridge and put in action. A builder of bridges stated today that the former structure was in an extra bad condition, and that steps were taken by the city just in time, as a short time longer and the old bridge would be lying in ruins.

**New Terminal at Fair Grounds**—  
Plans have been drawn up by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company for their part of the construction of the proposed new terminal stop at the state fair grounds, and the board has them under consideration. As soon as the Fairmount boulevard is prepared, the railway company will begin operations on their tracks at the fair grounds, and will arrange the terminal in accordance with the plan drawn up. The tracks will lead from the fair ground road to Highland avenue, from where they will cut short directly across a small portion of unoccupied property to the S. P. track.

**They Cut His Sentence**—  
Claud V. Wells, who was sentenced to serve an indeterminate term in the prison here, was brought up from Portland on the Oregon Electric Friday morning, accompanied by Sheriff Stevens, of Multnomah county, where he was convicted of the crime of bank robbery. Wells entered the prison doors this morning with apparently no concern, and was assigned to what will be his duties hereafter in the bake shop. Wells is a man 37 years of age. He has an opportunity, however, to redeem himself, by conducting himself as a good prisoner, and this may be the means of him shortening his sentence. The chance was given him because he confessed to Sheriff Stevens at the eleventh hour, and the sheriff was aided in recovering portions of the \$15,499 which was stolen from the bank.

## GETTING READY FOR FAIR AT SEATTLE

Seattle, Wash., March 27.—The management of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition have directed that the price of admission will be 50 cents for adults during the day and 25 cents during the evenings and on Saturdays. Children will be admitted for half-price.

The question of opening the exposition on Sunday will be decided within a few days. It has been proposed that the "Pay Streak" be opened, and that the band concerts be given on Sundays during the exposition period, but in no event will the exhibit buildings be opened.

The children of the county, of both the grammar and high schools, will be the guests of the officials of the exposition today. Preparations have been made to care for 50,000 children.

The fair officials are inviting the children in return for the service done by the schools in writing thousands of letters to pupils in Eastern schools, telling of the exposition.
