CITIZEN OF DAYTON WASHINGTON SEE TWO MOONS AT ONCE

PHENOMENON DUE TO ATMOSPHERIC CONDITIONS, AND WAS NOT DUE TO LOOKING THROUGH ANTI PROHIBITION GLASS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Dayton, Wash., March 27.—Two moons in one night. This is the phenomena that is interesting and monopolizing the conversation of the citizens of this city today. It should be explained at the outset that Dayton is a measurably "dry" town, and the people are not ordinarily subject to possible vision.

The two moons made their visit Wednesday evening. About 9 o'clock the two planets apparently appeared from behind hazy clouds, and hundreds of white-gowned figures began to appear in doorways to marvel and question their eyes. Earlier in the evening a strange atmospheric condition prevailed. A peculiar opacity,iveness was noted. This was accentuated by the fact that sound would not carry for any considerable distance. Familiar sounds, such as dogs barking, the clanging of bells and even human voices seemed far removed.

The peculiar phenomena is attributed to unusual humidity and density, causing refraction with retarding of sound waves. This is the third phenomena to occur here this spring, and has caused more comment than

the falling of a huge meteor, which descended here several weeks ago.

In Department No. 2.

Judge Galloway, of department No. 2 of the circuit court, adjourned his court this morning, after two days' session, in which several matters were disposed of.

In the accounting of James D. Rutherford vs. W. A. Rutherford, Judge Galloway allowed a motion for a temporary undertaking fixed in the sum of \$500.

The Pocatello Mercantile Co. made a motion to dismiss the case against Eva E. Mombert and J. Mombert, which was allowed by the court. Kaiser, Turner and Pogue appeared as counsel for the plaintiffs and Carson & Brown for the defendants.

The divorce suit of James Dick against Ellen Dick was settled yesterday, the decree giving the defendant \$100 for expenses during the pendency of the suit, and \$500 toward the support of the minor child.

Two divorces were awarded to the plaintiffs, as follows: Nina Prinsler vs. George Prinsler, Elizabeth Gibson vs. Wm. Gibson.

WOULD COMPEL RAILROAD TO MAINTAIN ITS ROAD

During the freshest of the winter of 1906-7 the railroad bridge across the South Fork of the Santiam river, on the Woodburn-Springfield branch of the Southern Pacific Company was washed out, and has never been rebuilt. Trains are operated on this branch between Woodburn and Crabtree only. The track south of Crabtree, or south of the river and Tallman is used only as a spur, and is operated over only when freight enough to fill a car accumulates at Spicer. Springfield traffic is now handled via Eugene or via Albany and Tallman.

Some time ago the farmers along the Springfield branch between Crabtree and Tallman filed a complaint with the Railroad Commission, alleging the inadequacy of the service, and asked that the bridge be ordered rebuilt. After fully investigating the matter the commission turned the matter over to the attorney-general for the purpose of compelling the company to rebuild the bridge. The

attorney-general, on account of the press of business in his office, did not get to the matter until a few days ago, when a petition, signed by the Railroad Commission, for a writ of mandamus requiring the building of the bridge, was filed in Judge Galloway's court.

This will be an interesting case, and will be hard fought by the railroad company, which claims there is not enough business along that portion of the line to justify the construction and maintenance of the bridge. The commission claims that the right-of-way was given to the old company for the purpose of building a road from Woodburn to Springfield, and that there exists an implied contract to operate trains, and this cannot be done without the rebuilding of the bridge. The railroad company claim it will cost \$25,000 to rebuild the bridge.

The matter will be heard before Judge Galloway some time next month.
