ELEPHANT RUNS AMUCK IN SAN BERNARDINO

[United Press Leased Wire, San Bernardino, Cal., March 27.—Quieting down after a night's rampage, during which he tore up trees, smashed through fences and overturned everything moveable he found in his path, Nero, one of the big elephants with Norris & Rowe's circus, meekly allowed himself to be recaptured here early today.

Nero broke loose about 11 o'clock last night, when he was being loaded on the circus train here. Trumpeting with rage the huge animal lumbered through the streets of the town, leaving a train of terror in his wake. People fled the streets, and the majority of the population were in a panic within two minutes after Nero started to run away.

After wrecking considerable property, the big elephant began to calms down, and it was believed that he could be recaptured without difficulty. Apparently realizing the plight of his keepers, Nero tantalized them by refusing to allow himself to be chained. It was not until early today, when he was apparently sleepy and willing to be fed, that the big runaway hunted up the circus camp and allowed his feet to be shackled.

RUSSIA AND JAPAN WILL FIGHT AGAIN

Bellingham, Wash., March 27.—That the next great war between world powers will be between Russia and Japan, and that there is no chance of war between Japan and the United States, were the statements made by Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans today.

"A great war is certainly coming between Russia and Japan," said the admiral. "It will come just as soon as Russia can complete the building of another fleet. That may be two years or longer. Russia is at present bending every effort to put herself in readiness for the struggle. She is rushing two lines of railroads across Siberia, organizing her army and navy and securing funds."

"Talk of war between Japan and the United States. There will be no war, except for commercial supremacy of the Pacific."
