SOUTH SALEM WANTS FORTY BLOCKS OF STREET IMPROVEMENT

The Seventh Ward Improvement League meets tonight to consider the report of a special committee on street improvement. The work of outfitting the district to be improved has already been done, and property owners will be present tonight at the rooms of the club in the Mason box factory, to discuss the matter. The people favor grading and ditching about a 30-foot street, the earth substructure to be solidly rolled and this fall coated with coarse gravel, to be rolled down, and then finished with a fine course of gravel for a driveway.

The committee on resolutions, has prepared the following resolution, to be acted upon tonight:

Be it resolved, "That those portions of the following named streets, viz: High, Liberty and Oakman, lying between Mission and Myers streets, in the seventh ward of the city of Salem, be improved by draining and grading the same, and also by laying down a substantial amount of gravel thereon, and that all those portions of the following named streets, viz: Owens, Bush, Kearney and Mission lying between High street and Oakman street aforesaid be improved in a similar manner, and that that portion of Miller street extending from Commercial street to the western limits of the said city of Salem be improved in the same manner."

Be it further resolved That the expense of making such improvement be borne by the abutting property owners.

Lastly, be it resolved, That the common council of the city of Salem aforesaid, be requested to pass an ordinance immediately directing the aforesaid streets to be improved in the manner hereinafter specified.

ANOTHER RAILROAD ACROSS CONTINENT

Missoula, Mont., March 29.—Chicago and the Pacific coast are today connected by another trans-continental railroad line, the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound. The last spike in the newest overland route was driven at 4 o'clock last night, two miles east of Missoula. The gigantic task of laying 2424 miles of rails over mountains and plains was finished without the customary ceremony. Besides the large truck-laying gang, there were present at the conclusion of the work only Chief Engineer Dauby and special officers of the road from the Missoula office.

Within three weeks it is expected the work remaining on the line unfinished will be completed, and in 60 days the road will be turned over to the operating department, and through train service established.

STEAMER POMONA WAS BADLY DAMAGED

The river steamer Pomona, which sunk in the lower Willamette several days ago, is now lying in the Portland shipyard undergoing much needed repairs. The accident damaged the boat in the neighborhood of \$1,500, and although this amount is large, further damage was saved the company by the freight being saved. The boat had on a monster load of freight, and had this become a total loss, the damage would have been much greater. In the bottom of the steamer there was found six holes from one to three feet in diameter.

The steamer Modoc is taking the regular run of the Pomona and the big steamer is doing good work in the present fair stage of water. The Modoc brought up 20 tons of asphalt last night and unloaded it at the O. C. T. Company's dock. The shipment was consigned to the street paving department here.

POWER LINE FROM EUGENE TO ALBANY

The Northwestern Corporation, of which A. Welch, of Portland, is the head, has employed Capt. Tice, of Baker City, to go to Eugene and make a survey for their new power line on the Mackenzie, with a transmission line to Albany for the lighting and street car service there. Capt. Tice was educated at West Point, and served with the United States army in the Philippines in the engineering corps. He went up to Eugene on the local Monday night.

MONMOUTH MAKES SPLENDID SHOWING

Monmouth, Ore., March 25, 1909.

Salem, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—The student body of the Oregon State Normal School at Monmouth requests the courtesy of a hearing, through your columns, in regard to the Normal School controversy. We feel that our school and its faculty and students have been grossly wronged not only in the failure of the Legislature to provide support but in the unjust and untrue statements published in many papers.

The Monmouth School has been operated since January 1, 1907, without state funds. In addition, great publicity was given the fact that the Board of Regents had closed the institution in July, 1907, for lack of funds, and little notice taken of the fact that the same Board accepted large donations from friends of the Normal and reopened it in August, 1907. These facts, coupled with the natural fear of students and their parents that the school might be unable to complete the year, combined to shake confidence and made a handicap almost insuperable.

In spite of all these adverse, the old "Monmouth Spirit" rose to the occasion and alumni and friends raised and paid into the State Treasury six thousand dollars to enable the regents to carry on the school during the year 1907-8. The local school district doubled its special tax and added five thousand dollars. Tuition receipts amounted to more than three thousand dollars. The faculty donated in salary reductions five thousand dollars, making a total provision of nineteen thousand dollars

for the year's budget, not one cent of which was supplied by the state.

A similar plan was followed for the present year, 1908-9, only of necessity the resources were more limited. The local school district paid the salaries of the principal of the training department and of the four critics, and other expenses to the amount of five thousand dollars. Seven additional instructors were employed, five accepting the mere pittance of fifty dollars a month, and two, President Remier and Mr. Butler, donating their services. The teachers' salary sacrifice this year amounts to nearly six thousand dollars. The cash donations will amount to over three thousand dollars, making a total for the year of about seventeen thousand dollars, with not a penny from the state.

Last year, Monmouth students paid twenty-five dollars tuition, double the charges made at the other State Normals, and at the State University and Agricultural College. This year, the students have cheerfully paid the same fee and when the regular session of the Legislature adjourned without making an appropriation, a student mass meeting was called, where one hundred and ten students subscribed over fourteen hundred dollars in order that the school should not be closed. Practically all of us are self-supporting any yet we gladly put up our hard-earned money both because we want normal training and because we mean to stand by our dear old school to the very last.

We are also self-respecting and resent bitterly the unfair and untrue charges against our school. We know
