FINE SHOWING CAUSES OIL STOCKS TO JUMP IN PRICE

Willamette Valley Oil Company Highly Pleased With Indications and Advance Stock After April 15.

Portland, Oregon, March 29, 1909.

STANLEY KETCHEL TO MEET JOHNSON

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New York, March 30.—Declaring that his man is absolutely sincere in his desire to fight Jack Johnson for the heavyweight championship of the world, Willie Britt today, on behalf of Stanley Ketchel, covered the negro's \$5,000 forfeit to bind a match. "We are not flourishing," said Britt. "We have meant business all along. Johnson caught us unawares when he demanded an immediate posting of the \$5,000 forfeit when I had my conference in Chicago with him last week. But the money is up now and we are ready to talk business with Johnson whenever he says the word."

In posting the forfeit today Britt beat Al Kaufman to it by a nose. The big Californian, who has consistently drawn the color line, declared last night that he would take Johnson on, Billy Delaney, his manager, having consented to a meeting with the black, and that he would take steps to looking toward the binding of a match.

Many followers of the fight game refuse to take Kaufman's talk seriously, believing that he is merely looking for a little advertising, his vaudeville engagements having proved somewhat of a flop.

HEAVY EARTHQUAKE JARS OCEAN LINER

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, March 30.—After experiencing a heavy submarine earthquake on March 14, the Pacific Mail liner Manchuria, is in port today, no worse for the tremor beneath the waves.

The earthquake occurred during the night when the vessel was 172 miles eastward of Yokohama. Those who were awake at the time, experienced a sinking sensation, and then the ship came up on the waves with a heavy crash, throwing many of the passengers from their berths.

There was a small panic following the shock, but the passengers were reassured by the officers, who informed them that the ship had not struck. An examination of the propeller showed it intact, and soundings showed the usual depths.

FAIRMOUNT TEAM WILL PLAY BALL

The South Salem Fairmount Club held a meeting last night at the home of Waldo Miller, and the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Waldo Miller, president; Wm. Zosel, secretary; Lee Page, treasurer; Ray West, manager. The club made a new rule in picking the players for the baseball team this season, and the power which is usually vested in the manager of a team, to do the choosing of the different players, is taken away, and the club has elected Miller, Jory and West to select a team of the club.

It was thought for a time that the Fairmount lads would not be seen on the field this season, owing to the proposed league, but when questioned in regard to the matter, Manager West, of the baseball organization, stated that he had been promised by all the old players to stay with the Fairmount club, and that none of the boys had any intention of entering or attempting to tryout on any other team, since the Fairmount toffers have shown a willingness to give the club support this season.

The first move the Fairmount club will make this year will be to buy the baseball uniforms from Watt Shipp, the sporting goods merchant. These suits were worn last season by the team, but were not the property of the club, and owing to the suits being in first-class shape and of good material, the club has decided to purchase them.

The Fairmount ball park, at the intersection of Mission and Liberty streets, will be put in condition, and the team will begin practice shortly. Dates for games have also been asked for with several aggregations in different parts of the state.

SUPREME COURT DECISIONS TODAY

The Supreme Court handed down four decisions today, as follows:

G. W. Young respondents vs. Arie D. Young, appellant, appealed from Circuit Court of Douglas County, J. W. Hamilton, Judge, affirmed per curiam.

W. H. H. Morgan et al. appellants, vs. The City of Portland et al. respondents, appealed from the Circuit Court of Multnomah County, M. O. George, Judge; reversed in opinion by Justice Bean. Another case of a similar character was reversed by Justice Bean, Ellis G. Hughes et al., vs. City of Portland, et al., being the principal parties to the suit. Both of these cases were instigated over the remonstrance of several people of Portland made to the re-assessment of River and North Yamhill street improvements.

L. Y. Keady respondents vs. The United Railway Company, appealed from the Circuit Court of Multnomah County, Thomas O'Day, Judge, motion to dismiss appeal denied by Chief Justice Moore.

ADMITS IT STOLE LAND.

Utah Company Also Relinquishes Land and Pays for Product.

Salt Lake City, March 30.—The Utah Fuel Company pleaded guilty in the United States court yesterday to the fraudulent acquisition of 14,049 acres of coal land, and paid a fine of \$8,000, also \$192,000 for the coal extracted, and relinquished the land. It was acquired through dummy entrymen as agricultural land.
