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THE LOW POLITICAL STANDARDS OF OREGON.

It is to be regretted that prominent Oregon politicians are trying to force the appointment of T. Cader Powell to a prominent federal office.

This writer does not know a single fact personally against Mr. Powell, but that HE WAS DEFAULTER IN A COUNTY OFFICE AT PORTLAND.

But isn't that enough to bar him from further promotion, or are men who are delinquent in duty to be rewarded for their delinquency?

Is there no sane left among the Oregon political bosses, and we are ashamed to say IN THIS CASE THEY ARE REPUBLICANS.

Is there no standard of political decency set up in Oregon to encourage honest and decent men to glory in the name Republican?

About two-thirds of the candidates selected and recommended for appointment to judicial and political offices are rejected.

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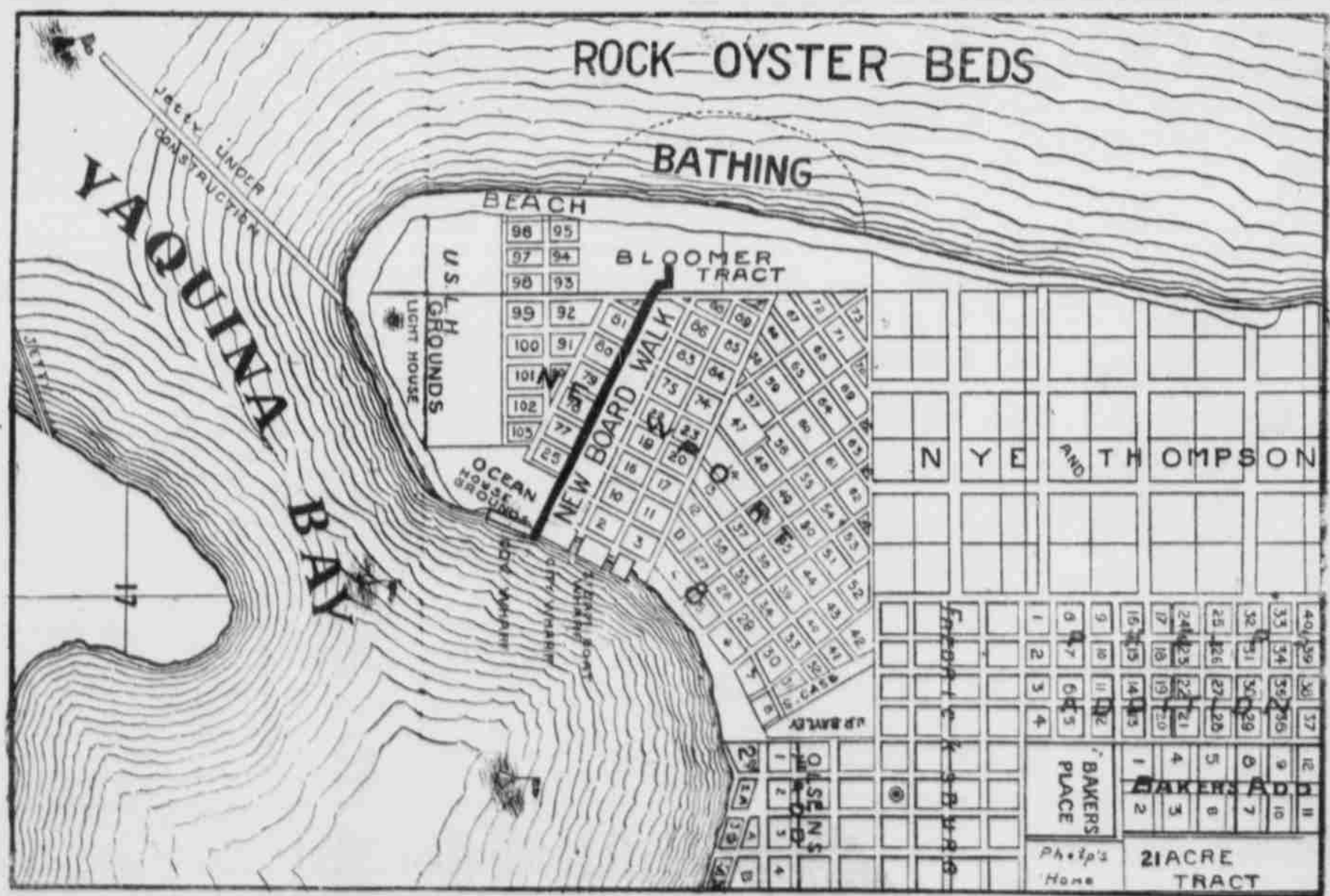
