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AIRSHIP MAKES RECORD FLIGHT IN STORM SHIP BLOWN TO KINDLING WOOD BY TERRIFIC EXPLOSION OF OIL

BATTLES WITH STORM THIRTEEN HOURS AND IS A WINNER

COUNT ZEPPELIN WITH FOURTEEN PAS- SENGERS IN HIS GREAT AIRSHIP LANDS SAFELY AFTER FIERCE BATTLE WITH THE ELEMENTS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Dingolfing, April 1.—After a battle of 13 hours with adverse winds, with one motor out of commission, Count Zeppelin landed his great airship near here late this afternoon.
The accident to the rear motor caused the ship's helplessness and made necessary the evolution which caused great apprehension to those

who witnessed the struggle with the wind.
The forward motor worked well, but it did not produce sufficient power to drive the ship against the air currents, which at times reached great velocity.
On the way here the count dropped the following note to the cavalymen who were following the route of the ship:

"Beloved comrades, man ythanks; please continue to follow me until the wind dies down."
Count Zeppelin's masterful management of the aeroplane in the face of the wind storm, as proclaimed one of the most wonderful feats of aerial navigation the world has seen and his voyage of today has added new glory to the career of the veteran admiral of the air.

Story in Detail.

Berlin, April 1.—The great airship, with Count Zeppelin and 14 passengers aboard, was driven by a terrific storm from Friedrichshafen to the environs of Munich today, and was sighted this evening, after having been missed more than ten hours.

Though Munich was the count's destination, he evidently could not control the craft in the storm, and made no attempt to descend.

Zeppelin steered the ship about and started to return toward Friedrichshafen, a distance of 11 miles, but could make little or no headway against the wind. When last seen the ship was driving rapidly in a north-westerly direction from Munich. The city authorities are following it as best they can in automobiles, and several squadrons of cavalry also have been ordered to follow as closely as possible.

Airship Unmanageable.

Berlin, April 1.—A dispatch from Landshut, 40 miles northeast of Munich, says that Count Zeppelin's airship passed over that city this afternoon, and seems to be unmanageable. It is believed the count was in distress. The ship was headed toward the Bochemerwald mountains, nearly 70 miles distant.

INSURANCE LAW LIMITS AMOUNT OF BUSINESS

New York, April 1.—The big insurance companies today lost their fight to have repealed that section of the Hughes insurance laws, which limits the amount of new business they may take annually.

Justice James A. O'Gorman, of the supreme court of New York, handed down the decision today holding that the section is constitutional and defeating the action of the companies to nullify that part of the law.

It is expected that the case will be taken to the court of appeals of the state, and, if possible, to the United States supreme court.

The section of the law affected provides that no insurance company shall write new policies amounting to more than \$150,000,000 in one year.

Last year the larger companies reached the limit in the latter part of November and during the remainder of that month and throughout December were forced to refuse all business except that which could be taken in the form of renewals at the expiration of policies outstanding.

This is one of the provisions put into the laws formed following the investigation of the Armstrong committee, conducted by Charles E. Hughes, the present governor of New York, who then was counsel for the committee.

CHICAGO FACES STRIKE WHICH MAY BECOME GENERAL

Chicago, April 1.—The beginning of what may be a disastrous labor struggle in the Windy City came today when 150 steam fitters walked out, and were joined promptly by the electricians. At the same time the grocery clerks and their employers felt out and the business agents of the clerks' union ordered a general strike throughout the city.

The trouble started several days ago, when the steam fitters, 1000 strong, struck after a disagreement with their employers on the old question of shorter hours and increase in wages. Today 500 junior steam fitters struck out of sympathy, making 1500 in all in this trade who have dropped work together.

This afternoon the grocery clerks and their employers failed to reach an agreement, after a conference on wages and hours. Thereupon the business agents were ordered to call out every union clerk in the city. This will affect seriously 20 of the biggest grocery houses in Chicago. To prevent an outbreak while the employers in these big houses are trying to fill their daily orders with non-union help, the police have been summoned.

COAL OIL EXPLODES KILLING FIFTEEN AND ANNIHILATING SHIP

FRENCH TANK SCHOONER CARRYING 1800 BARRELS OF OIL WAS PREPARING TO UNLOAD AT MARSEILLES WHEN THE EXPLOSION TOOK PLACE

Marseilles, France, April 1.—Eight men were killed and seven mortally wounded today when the three-masted schooner Jules Henry, from Philadelphia, was blown to kindling wood by the explosion of eighteen hundred barrels of kerosene which she carried.

The accident occurred in this harbor. So terrific was the explosion that only small portions of the schooner were found.

The crew consisted of 18 men. The eight dead are known to have been killed outright. The seven mortally wounded were saved by craft that rushed to the scene. The remaining three were rescued and have a chance to

recover, though they also are severely injured.

The schooner was a French tank vessel and was preparing to unload here when the explosion occurred. The vessel was in command of Captain Escoffier. The cause of the accident is unknown.

Investigation this evening showed that the explosion followed the entrance to the tank hold of a member of the Verita's agency and the second officer, who were inspecting the vessel. Among the fatally injured were two inspectors.

The injured and killed were blown high into the air by the explosion, which shook the entire city.

CRAZY SNAKE IS STILL IN HIDING

Pierce, Okla., April 1.—With the surrender to the troops at daybreak this morning of Eastman Jones, brother-in-law of Crazy Snake, the district, the backbone of the uprising distict, the backbone of the uprising is now broken. Jones himself has been sent into the hills to bring back Crazy Snake, for the chief's wife, daughter, daughter-in-law, two brothers-in-law, son and nephew are now among the prisoners, and it seems almost futile for him to hold out any longer.

The truth is, however, Crazy Snake fears the wrath of the white farmers more than he fears a trial in a court of law. The soldiers, who are now searching the Tiger mountains for the Indian chieftain, have sent word to him, promising him protection if he will surrender, and now that Crazy Snake's brother-in-law has been sent to plead with him, and lay the existing facts before him it is believed that he will yield and give himself up to the troops.

WANTS KETCHEL TO MEET JOHNSON

San Francisco, April 1.—Fight Promoter James Coffroth is now hot on the trail of Stanley Ketchel and Jack Johnson, determined to match the colored champion and the defender of Jack O'Brien, in a battle on the Fourth of July. He will leave for the East in a few days, and expects to have no trouble in signing the two men, particularly as he intends to give them both a guarantee.

"It is the biggest thing in sight," said Coffroth today in discussing the proposed match. "What's the use in chasing after Jeffries? Nobody knows whether or not he will ever fight again. It looks like too much of a risk. Here is Ketchel willing and anxious to get at the black champion. He will give Johnson a great fight, and draw a great house. At the same time, I will not be compelled to make them such a flattering inducement as I would be forced to offer Jeffries."

MEXICO FACES SMALL REVOLUTION

Chihuahua, Mex., April 1.—Mexican ranchers and Texas Indian are in open revolt near San Andreas today, after having killed a tax collector and several deputies, who tried to enforce on interest rate of duty on work oxen and horses.

Two special trains loaded with government troops and rurales have been sent to the scene, and a battle is expected before nightfall.

Incensed at the increased taxation the ranchers and Indians engaged in an encounter with the officers while at San Andreas several days ago. After killing the collector and his assistant, they took flight, and a short distance out of town, cut the telegraph and telephone wires, preventing news of the battle reaching outside the world until today.

News of the revolt was circulated throughout the state, other Indians and ranchers hastened to join the fugitives, and they are now believed to have recruited a strong force and taken refuge in the mountains.

El Paso, Texas, April 1.—First reports of the war raging in the province of San Andreas, Mexico, were not exaggerated according to advices received here today. Mexican ranchers and Indians, incensed at heavy taxes imposed upon them by the authorities, have entrenched themselves in a mountain stronghold and are in a position to withstand a siege by the troops which are being rushed to the scene.

Although several companies of troops have been sent out to capture the insurrectionists, the soldiers are plainly afraid of their enemies and cannot be induced to get into close enough quarters with them.

For this reason and the fact that the rebels have selected their position with good judgment, there appears little likelihood that they will be overpowered soon.

Reports from Chihuahua today state that El Norte, Governor Creel's own paper, admits that there is trouble in San Andreas. Although the
