CAN SHOOT AIRSHIPS
TEN MILES DISTANT

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Los Angeles, Cal., April 1.—By means of an electric spark operated as far as ten miles away from the object of its attack, C. W. Siroh, a well-known aeronaut and inventor, says that he can destroy any gas inflated dirigible airship which has ever been made. He utilizes the principle of electrical induction, which has been known to aeronauts for some time and which has been responsible for several odd accidents in recent years.

When Count Zeppelin's airship was destroyed some time ago, Siroh opened correspondence with the European aeronaut, advancing this theory as the cause of the disaster. Working on the principle, Siroh now believes that he has evolved a method of defense which can bring about the destruction of any similar air craft should it approach with hostile intentions.

WAR IN THE AIR
IN THE BALKANS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Vienna, April 1.—That the popularity of Crown Prince George among the jingoes of Serbia is responsible for his withdrawal of his letter renouncing the succession to the Serbian throne, is the view taken of the incident by Austrian diplomats today. King Peter, they say, would gladly have accepted the resignation and named his son, Alexander, as heir, had he dared to invite the enemy of the war party and the younger element of the Serbian people, who are loyal to the crown prince.

The supporters of the king are deeply disappointed at the unexpected developments and dark hints are heard in Belgrade that another and a better way will be found to rid the country of the menace of the successorship of the degenerate crown prince. His accession to the throne would undoubtedly plunge Serbia into civil war, and for this reason, his enemies are determined to get rid of him.

AN INTERESTING
DIVORCE CASE

Reno, Nev., April 1.—Great interest is being taken here today in the arguments in the divorce case of Virginia Harned, the actress, against her husband, E. H. Sothern, because it is believed that the case will prove a test of the Nevada laws on the subject of divorce.

Neither of the contending parties are present, the hearing being conducted by means of depositions, and Mrs. Sothern's attorneys contend that this is all that is necessary, inasmuch as the actor was regularly and properly served with the original papers, when he was playing an engagement in this city.

KING VICTOR WILL
NOT MEET ROOSEVELT

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Naples, April 1.—If King Victor can persuade himself that it would not appear undignified on his part to greet a plain American citizen who has been president of eighty millions of people, he will make the journey to this city in time to meet Colonel Theodore Roosevelt when the ship bearing him to the African hunting fields stops here on its Mediterranean voyage.

Victor has expressed to his advisers a wish to welcome Roosevelt, but this desire on his part has been frowned down by the court, and an official statement has been issued at the quinal announcing flatly that the king and Roosevelt will not meet, at least until Roosevelt returns from the dark continent.

COAL MINERS STRIKE
IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

McCloud, Alberta, April 1.—The International Federation of Miners today ordered a strike in all the mines of southern Alberta, in East British Columbia, as a result of its failure to reach an agreement with the employers on the question of a wage scale.

Since Hill secured control of the Crowns Nest Pass Coal Company, he granted an increase in wages to his men, and the other operators assert that this act of his precipitated the strike.

Two years ago a serious fuel famine resulted in the adjacent provinces when these miners struck.
