THE TILLAMOOK RAILROAD.

Mr. Harriman deserves credit for his determination to see the Tillamook railroad through to completion.

He has set aside two million dollars to complete the Lytle ROAD TO THE TILLAMOOK LINE.

SALEM CAPITALISTS SHOULD HELP INDUSTRIES.

Salem needs industries.

In the past few years Salem has let more industries DIE THAN HAVE BEEN HELPED INTO LIFE.

A box factory, a gasoline engine factory, a broom factory, and others have been let die.

There are small industries in the city today that are languishing for want of encouragement.

There are the manufacture of caskets, of electrical fittings, and hardwood manufacture—ALL REQUIRING THE HELP OF LOCAL CAPITAL.

Salem capital has gone freely into Portland real estate and into Portland manufactures.

The building industry has been neglected by Salem capital. Rents for dwellings and business purposes have advanced remarkably, because BUILDING HAS NOT KEPT PACE WITH POPULATION OR BUSINESS.

A modern hotel, a modern office building are badly needed at Salem, and would pay good interest.

Modern flats and cottages.

There should be some plan adopted of giving SUBSIDIES TO ENCOURAGE INDUSTRIES.

Local capital should assist in establishing industries with home payrolls.

SALEM CAPITAL SHOULD HELP SALEM INDUSTRIES TO LIVE.

That has been done to some extent in the past, but must be done more extensively in the future.

NO NORMAL SCHOOL EXHIBITS WANTED

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific fair wants exhibits from the Oregon State Normal Schools.

As this state has refused to spend a dollar in support of normal schools, NO SUCH EXHIBIT SHOULD BE MADE.

It would be a public deception to display as part of the Oregon educational exhibit any work done at normal schools.

The Oregon normal schools will be closed after the end of the present year.

That is the program deliberately adopted by the supreme legislative power, AND THE SCHOOL MUST ABIDE BY IT.

The state is not entitled to have normal school exhibits at Seattle, or at any other exposition.

THE STATE EDUCATIONAL EXHIBIT SHOULD REPRESENT CONDITIONS AS THEY REALLY EXIST.

Public spirited citizens are putting up money to run the three normal schools until July 1st, when they close.

The state did not even appropriate money TO KEEP THE BUILDINGS INSURED OR EMPLOY A WATCHMAN.

The state board will have to sell off furniture to hire some one to keep cattle and tramps out of the premises.

The neolithic policies emanating from the great educator of public sentiment at Portland WILL PREVAIL FOR A WHILE IN OREGON.

The cave-dwellers of the stone age, who controlled the Oregon senate should be exhibited at Seattle.

But happier days will come with another age, when educators will not be considered as nobodies by the towering lights of journalism.

With a wide, new bridge, with paving over the hill, and with forty to sixty blocks of improved streets, South Salem real estate is looking up.

OLD CITY HALL AT 'FRISCO DYNAMITED

San Francisco, April 2.—With a deafening roar, a large section of the west wing of the old city hall at the corner of Larkin and McAllister streets, was blown up at 5 o'clock this morning by the wrecking company which is engaged in the task of demolishing the huge building, ruined by the earthquake of three years ago. The explosion created a panic, and, for a minutes, the people in the neighborhood had visions of another disastrous trembler.

The flying bricks and the tumbling girders narrowly missed a Larkin street car filled with people. The debris filled the street. The pavement was punched full of holes and the car rails were bent so that traffic of all kinds was blocked on the thoroughfare.

Responsibility for the explosion is not yet fixed. Some say that it was a premature blast, carelessly fired, while others assert that it was carefully timed and set.

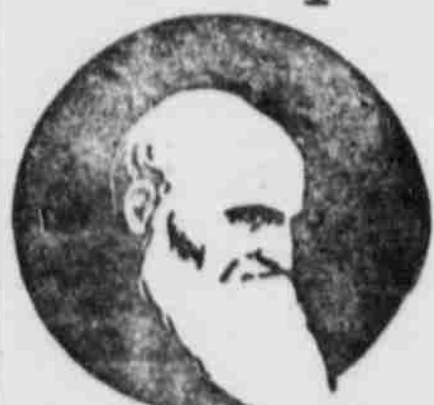
