It is a significant fact that Congressmen Hawley and Ellis went before President Taft and plead for the appointment of Senator Fulton to the judgeship created by that demand for himself. They see no incongruity in a member of the senate creating an office to be filled by himself. The Constitution of the United States and of each state forbids specifically and by implication representatives of the people in the house or senate creating offices or voting on bills in which they are to have a direct interest. But what are constitutional limitations and inhibitions in these days of office-chasing? It is a notable fact that Senators Bourne and Chamberlain were not laboring with Taft to have Fulton appointed. Who comes nearer representing the people of Oregon, the two congressmen, or the two senators? Perhaps the next primary election will shed some light on this question.

Senator Chamberlain has been assured of hearty co-operation in laboring for Oregon by Senator Bourne and Congressman Ellis. It is expected that Congressman Hawley will also fall into line for a greater Oregon, with more business results, and less politics. The need of this is very apparent to the people of Portland, who are losing their land office, who have lost millions in government contracts for army and navy supplies, and who are liable to lose the executive headquarters of the war department at Vancouver, as they have already lost the lighthouse service, and may lose other branches of the federal service. The need of an united Oregon delegation—united for the greater results that lie far beyond the game of petty factional politics—appeals to people here at home and ought to appeal to every member of the delegation. Oregon has had too much petty graft politics for partisan factional ends—like the delegation boosting for T. Cader Powell, for whom little good and much bad has been said and published.

The Portland Spectator, Hugh Hume, editor, in a good-natured, yet broody and fearless way, deals with public questions arising in state and city. The editor seems to consider that the manners and address of a gentleman are becoming to a newspaper, and that some attention to literary quality is not unbecoming to the less-hurried conduct of a weekly journal of criticism. At any rate the Spectator is something after its distinguished namesake—deliberate and philosophical in its utterances upon matters of importance to the community. It ought to be widely read in the homes of the Northwest, where culture in any form gains admittance.

A Chicago broker who has been prominent as a church worker, has fled his home and the community upon the discovery being made that he is an ex-convict. It is far more awful to be discovered in that than to have it discovered that a man ought to be a convict, but the evidence is not handy. Society has no condemnation for the man who can escape conviction.

Professor Glen, the vocalist, teacher of dramatic art and old English

literature at the State University, is said to be the greatest favorite with the students, and not the football coach.

Of course, a political machine newspaper at Portland will prefer a Democratic mayor to any Republican who would be mere putty in its hands.

Newspapers back East are advising readers not to be in a hurry to take off their storm doors before May 15, at least.

### ESTHER MITCHELL LEAVES ASYLUM

 Seattle, Wash., April 6.—Esther Mitchell, central figure in the murder of "Joshua" Creffield, and the killing of her brother, George Mitchell, who had shot the "Holy Roller" leader, has been paroled from the Stellacoom Asylum. She was taken to Oregon by O. V. Hurt, who suffered more than any other man from the Creffield teachings, and whose daughter married a Holy Roller agitator.

Superintendent A. P. Calhoun, of the Stellacoom Asylum, granted the parole for Miss Mitchell, with the approval, he said, of the Prosecuting Attorney of King County and Superior Court Judge A. W. Prater.

One of stipulations in the parole is that Miss Mitchell shall be returned to the Stellacoom Asylum if she shows any symptoms of a return of her malady. However, the Hurts took her to their home at Waldport, Oregon, and it is doubted by state officials whether Miss Mitchell could be compelled to return from that state.

"Apparently the girl has recovered," said Superintendent Calhoun today. "For some time she has appeared rational, and we could find no symptoms of any danger of the return of her affliction."

Esther Mitchell was one of Edmond Creffield's followers in the Holy Roller camps of Oregon, where Creffield was hailed as "Joshua" and the new Savior of the world. She was an intimate friend of Maud Hurl, who subsequently married Creffield and came to Seattle with him. Because of Creffield's influence over his sister and the practices preached in the Holy Roller camp, George Mitchell resolved to free his sister and the other Holy Rollers by killing "Joshua."

Mrs. Creffield died in prison, where she is believed to have committed suicide.

### LADY BUGS TO EAT THE OTHER BUGS

 Sacramento, Cal., April 6.—Thousands of ladybugs, which have been hibernating near the snow line at Dutch Flat, have been shipped to Imperial Valley by State Horticulturist Jeffrey to help the ranchers of the valley to rid themselves of the insect pests which have overrun that section of the state for the past month.

According to the opinion of eminent entomologists, the ladybug is arch enemy of all insect ranch impoverishers, and the hope is entertained that the unique shipment will be a material aid to the valley ranchers and fruit growers. It is estimated that the colony which has been making Dutch Flat its winter home numbers more than 500,000 insects.

### Freak Fruit Cake.

Many housewives would say fruit cake made without butter was a freak. The recipe below will, however, give you as rich, flavory a fruit cake as you ever tasted; yet there is no butter in it:

Mix four cups sifted pastry flour, one level teaspoon soda, two level teaspoons mixed spices (except cloves), one-fourth level teaspoon salt and two cups seeded and quartered raisins. Add also one-half cup nuts chopped fine, if you like. Blend one-half cup Cottolene with one cup brown sugar and one cup white sugar, add one cup molasses, one cup milk and then the flour mixture.
