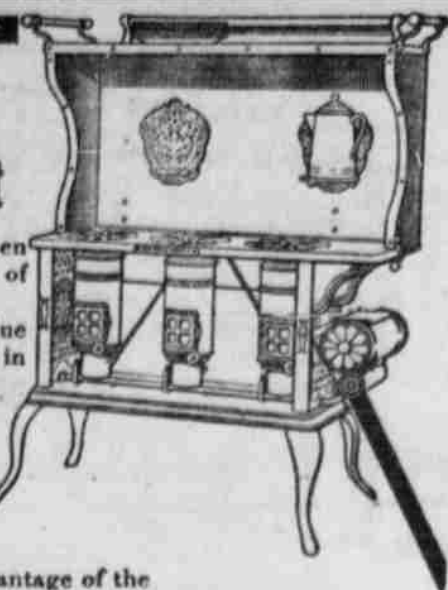

Stolz brought in a report accepting bid of W. H. Dalrymple to build ferry boat to bring gravel from Minto's island for use of the city.

IMPORTANT DECISION REGARDING CITIES

The supreme court handed down two decisions today, as follows: John K. Rollock, respondent, vs. J. H. Bennett and C. F. Humphreys, appellants; appealed from the circuit court of Coos county; Hamilton, judge; affirmed by Justice King. This was an equity case, in which action was taken to quiet title of certain properties in Coos county.

Clara Batdorf, respondent, vs. Oregon City, a municipal corporation, and A. Knapp, D. C. Williams, H. E. Straight, M. Nestin and H. Brandt, appellants; appealed from the circuit court of Clackamas county; T. A. McBride, judge; affirmed by Chief Justice Moore. This case attracted more or less attention, owing to the technical points involved, covering power vested in the executive body of a city. The action was brought against the municipal corporation, Oregon City, and its councilmen to recover damages for personal injury alleged to have been caused by wilful and gross neglect on the part of the defendants in failing to keep up the sidewalk construction along a public street. The case was brought to issue and a judgment in the sum of \$850 was returned against the city, but the councilmen were exonerated from liability by the judgment of the lower court. The city in turn appealed the case for relief from the \$850 judgment, and the plaintiff appealed because the co-defendants were released from all liability.

The supreme court holds, however, that, inasmuch as the city is in default, and the decision of the lower court is perfectly permissible, its constituents cannot be held liable for any injury or damage occurring to anyone from a defective walk or highway. The complaint in the case states that injury was caused by non-sufficiency, but did not allege that the councilmen possessed the requisite means with which to make repairs, and this being so the plaintiff was not prejudiced by the remarks of the court, to which exceptions was taken.

Davis Acquitted—

William J. Davis was acquitted this morning of the charge of unlawful cohabitation on a motion by Attorney Peter D'Arcy on the grounds that the indictment was insufficient. The court held that the indictment was defective and that it did not accuse Davis' mate of a crime.

Civil Case Argued—

The case of Randall vs. Haskell & Colvin is being argued before Judge Burnett today. This is a case appealed from the Justice Court in Woodburn.

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP WINS GREAT VICTORY

The city election at Eugene resulted in a victory of the Matlock ticket. Matlock is the present mayor and every municipal ownership man on his ticket was elected. It is not so much a personal victory as it is a victory for municipal improvement. Matlock was elected by a majority of 261, but the principle for which he stood, municipal ownership of the city water, and the creation of a water board, which carried by a vote of 973 to 392.

It was a great victory for those who believe in the cities owning their own water system.

GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES ENGAGE IN SMUGGLING

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Diego, Cal., April 6.—Smuggled furs and blankets, valued at \$1,500, are today in the custody of Customs Collector W. T. Blake, who seized them yesterday at the local office of the Wells Fargo Express Company. They are goods believed to have been brought from Chile on the two government mine-laying vessels, the Ringold and the Colonel Armistead, now in port.

The federal authorities intend to hold accountable for smuggling C. J. Campbell, engineering officer of the Ringold; James McAuley, assistant engineer on the Armistead; H. E. Evans and James Woodward, respectively sailing master and second officer on the Armistead.

OWNERS ASK TO BE HEARD

Hon. Tom Kay appeared before the city council Monday night and asked that the owners of the South mill creek ditch be given a hearing on the ordinance requiring them to fence and bridge the same. On motion of Mr. Hofer the owners are to meet with the committee on bridges and the committee on streets. The matter arose over the breaking down of the bridge across the ditch on South Winter street, the city ordinance requiring the owners of the ditch to replace the bridge.

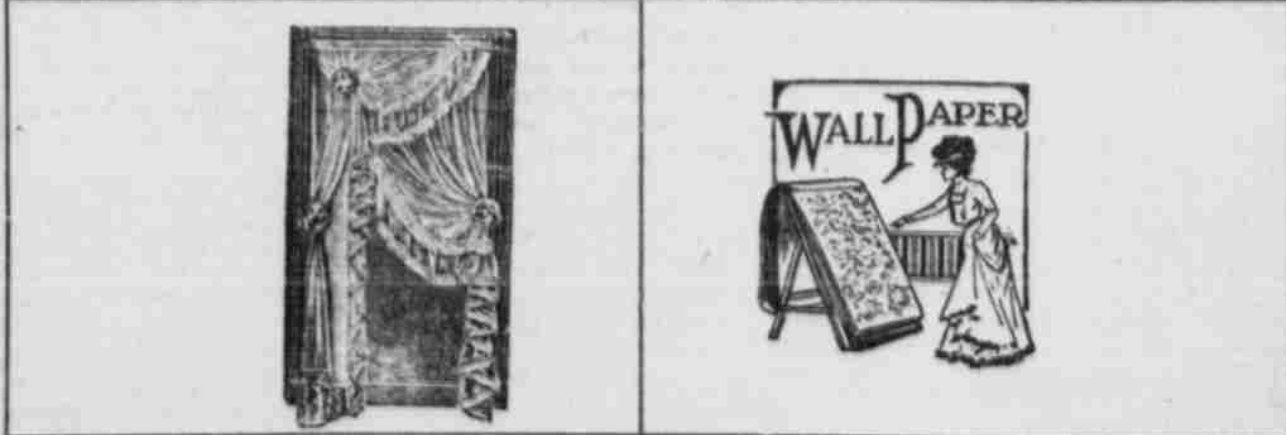
