THE WELCH FRANCHISE EXTENDED

STREET IMPROVEMENTS ORDERED

On motion of Mr. Stols, the Welch franchise ordinance was amended to extend the time for beginning work six months. The statement was made that the capitalists who are to build the line are to be out in May and go over the property. The Welch corporation agrees to pave any streets on the line of the franchise that may be ordered improved in the meantime.

Mr. Stockton reported from the lighting committee that, as the company could not get protection for the lights erected at their terminal stations, they would not maintain them.

The city attorney reported that property owners had a right to connect with the Court street sewer.

A proposition to make the fair grounds road 75 feet wide was referred to the special committee on fair grounds boulevard.

Street Improvements Ordered.

A new ordinance was introduced for bitulthic pavement on Court street, from Church to Twelfth, owing to defect in estimates, \$41,478.

Petition of R. B. Houston and others for bitulthic pavement on South Commercial street. City engineer ordered to prepare plans and specifications.

North Commercial street, 26 feet wide, gravel improvement.

Seventeenth street was ordered widened to 60 feet through High School addition.

South Salem streets ordered improved as petitioned for, graded and rolled 30 feet wide, with 12-foot gravel roadway, except Miller street, which is to be 16 feet wide. City engineer to prepare plans and specifications, and have additional man to establish grades, and same to be reported next Monday evening.

DEATH OF MRS. ARTHUR CONKLIN

Arthur Conklin, a well-known Oregon newspaper man and publisher of the Pacific Outlook, who is well known in this city, has recently lost his wife, who was a Salem teacher for a number of years, one of the faculty of the Oregon Institute for the Blind. She was known here as Miss Louise Church. Rev. F. C. Lovett prepared the following sketch of the deceased:

Louise Marian Conklin was born October 10th, 1872, at Honolulu, Hawaii. She graduated from Oberlin College, Ohio, in 1894, married at Cleveland, Ohio, December 10th, 1904 and passed from this life Friday, March 26th, 1909, at 4:20 p. m. leaving a husband, three children and two stepdaughters in the home. How brief are the outlines of her life, yet who but God can fill in between these lines words that shall truly portray her character. We justly think of her at a woman of large life whether we have in mind the breadth of her influence or its quality. By her interest in the education of the youth and the public enterprises of city she touched a large circle; by her qualities of heart and eminent ability she made friends of them all. Such a character as hers was sure to make many and strong friends. With rare gifts of leadership, social grace and musical talent she united inviolable good cheer and a lavish giving of time and strength. She will be greatly missed in the social, civic, educational and Christian circles, but she will be most missed in her home. There her noble life and rich gifts shone with peculiar beauty. "If to live in hearts we leave behind is not to die" few more really live than she. The audience that taxed to the utmost the capacity of the First Baptist Church Sunday afternoon showed the widespread sorrow of the community and sympathy with the home now without its mother. She has gone to a true reward.
