WORKING ON ROAD INTO THE SANTIAM

With the advent of good weather active work has started in the Santiam district. The several mining companies have reached an agreement by which the four miles of road yet to build to the smelter site will be completed just as quickly as men and money can do it. Mr. Otto Hanson, president of the Gold Creek Company, is on the ground, directing the work, and there is no doubt but that in a couple of months the machinery for the smelter will be on the way to the mouth of Gold creek. The work on the mines has been prosecuted vigorously during the winter. Consulting Engineer Valle, of the Gold Creek, Fremont and Electric having laid the work out, and it has been done systematically. The Santiam will make people sit up and take notice this summer, and before snow flies the smelter returns will show that it is really just what it is claimed to be by those interested, one of the great mining camps of the coast.

Mr. Paul Gadsden deserves unbounded praise for the consistency of his faith and the persistency of his push for the Santiam district. It is a case of faith with works, and is very much alive.

Zelda Selby, Baldwin's third daughter, whose existence was unknown until after her father's death, and Mrs. Anita McLaughry and Mrs. Clara Stocker, daughters and principal benefactors under the will, all obstacles to a speedy settlement of the estate have been removed. Baldwin's widow, who was practically cut off from the fortune by the will, has agreed to accept a compromise settlement offered by the daughters and Mrs. Selby capitulated after a conference of the heirs last night.

Although the terms of the settle-

ment with the two dissatisfied heirs have not been made public, it is understood that they will receive more than double the amounts left them in the will. The widow is reported to have accepted approximately \$400,000 and the daughters something more than \$150,000.

INCREASE DUE TO FOREST POLICY

San Francisco, April 7.—The policy of the government in segregating

lands of the forest reserve suitable for sheep and cattle raising, is, according to Assistant Forester A. F. Potter, the reason for the 10 per cent increase in the value of the cattle on the forest grazing lands during the past year.

Potter, who is making his semi-annual tour of the forest bureaus of the western division, is here today.
