Oregon Personalities.

Throughout the first hour pandemonium continued and the trading was enormous. The Patten interests sold steadily all morning, unloading a tremendous amount of May wheat, none of the sales having been made below \$1.24 up to noon.

In the meanwhile July wheat rose steadily, reaching \$1.10 at 12 o'clock.

James A. Patten was in personal charge of the firm's operations. At noon he declared that the talk of his trying to operate a corner was ridiculous. He said:

"The market today merely resulted from natural conditions and is not speculative."

Patton declined to say what amount of wheat he held, but it is safe to say that he had enormous holdings. He explained that he bought much of it at \$1.04, which means that on the sales today he cleared 20 cents per bushel.

If Patton gained on average of 20 cents per bushel on his sales, his profits on the morning's business are estimated from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000.

RISKS HIS LIFE TO SAVE SISTER

Seattle, Wash., April 7.—That little Buntia Clark is alive today is due entirely to the act of bravery performed by her brother, Johnny, eight years old. As she was being dragged under a street car yesterday, while pedestrians, too horror-stricken to attempt to rescue her, momentarily expected to see the tiny form crushed by the wheels, Johnny deliberately threw himself under the car, and, supporting himself with one hand, seized his sister with the other.

In this position he clung to her dress until the car stopped. Otherwise she would have been injured. The girl was coasting when she ran under the car. Johnny happened to be at the crossing at the time.

Catlin Linn, hop men, have purchased from Mrs. G. G. Lonsdale, of Portland, the two-story brick building and adjoining frame structures known as the Gray block, at the corner of Liberty and State streets, this city. The consideration was \$35,000. The new owners will remodel the block and put in several modern store fronts.

WHEAT'S RECORD PRICE (Continued from page 1.)

The result of this heavy profit-taking movement was that May wheat was hammered down, and 15 minutes after the opening had dropped back from \$1.25 1/4 to \$1.24 1/4.

It was one of the liveliest sessions seen in the pit in many a day. The rush started from the very instant of opening, and the excitement by no means ceased when the Patten sales apparently were stopped, after the half million bushels had been disposed of. There was an intense feeling of nervous expectation, the traders being prepared for almost any sudden turn, with the prices still left high above previous records, even after being hammered down by the Patten sales.

Several high authorities expressed the opinion that the great advance was the natural result of conditions and was a healthy movement.

Patten denied that he had attempted a corner. The Patten holdings, purchased around \$1.04, were unloaded in enormous quantities above \$1.24.

There was great excitement toward the close as the result of the frantic efforts of the shorts to buy. This was especially true of May wheat July wheat closed at \$1.11 1/4.

The net advances during the day over yesterday's closing prices were as follows:

May wheat, up 3 1/4 cents
July wheat up 3 cents.

Liverpool Responds.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, April 7.—Today's session of the wheat market here and at Liverpool proved the most exciting for a generation and prices eclipsed those shown for many years. The market closed with May 3 1/4 cents higher than on Monday, July, 3 1/4, September 2 1/4 and December 2 1/4 cents a bushel above the closing price of the previous session.

The government figures issued today show the condition of the win-

ter wheat crop at \$2.2 per cent compared with \$1.3 per cent December 31, and \$9.9 per cent on this date a year ago.

Liverpool started the ball rolling today when it opened 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 higher and closed with net gains of 1 1/4 to 2d over yesterday.

Shipments of wheat to Europe from south of the Equator have practically ceased. Messages from Winnipeg state that London was bidding yesterday 1 1/4 to 2 cents a bushel above Monday's prices.

FORTY FISHERMEN DROWNED IN BALTIC

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Berlin, April 7.—Ten fishing vessels during the terrific gale which swept the Baltic off the German coast today, and 40 fishermen are known to have perished. A mountainous sea is running, rendering impossible any attempt to rescue the survivors.

The storm, accompanying a driving rain, swept down and the little fleet with appalling suddenness. It was followed by a heavy mist, making it impossible to secure further communication with the open sea.
