County Commissioners Meet—The county commissioners met this afternoon and the first matters taken up were the bills against the county, which were much smaller in number than heretofore. The commissioners will have an easy time in transacting the business this term, as petitions have come in very slowly during the past month.

Cupid Woke Up—County Clerk Allen issued the following marriage licenses today to Salem people: Fred J. Browning, 25, to Fannie Pratt, 17; A. C. DeVoe, 29, to Pearl Agnes Schomaker, 24. This is the first time the county clerk has had an opportunity to open his marriage book since the 4th of the present month, and two at a time he considers outside of the ordinary.

Can Practice Law—A. W. Norblad was given a permit to practice law in Oregon this morning by the supreme court on admission papers from the state of Michigan. The admission certificate is only good for nine months. The applicant is to practice law in Astoria.

U. of O. Booklet—The Journal has just received the March number of the University of Oregon Bulletin. It is a handsomely prepared booklet of 29 pages, showing a number of views on the University buildings and campus, with a large amount of condensed information in regard to the work of the University, entrance requirements, cost of living, student life, etc.

To Locate the Blame—An appealed case is being heard in the supreme court today, the principals being Della Kennedy vs. W. J. Hawkins. A judgment was given the plaintiff in the lower courts of Multnomah county in the sum of \$400, being a portion of \$132 sued for by the plaintiff on the allegation that property belonging to her was ruined through the collapse of a building in Portland, due to the neglect of the contractors constructing the building.

Action for Damages—The action for damages between U. G. Kightlinger vs. J. F. Calbreath is being tried in the circuit court today. Frank Holmes is appearing for the plaintiff, while G. G. Bingham is counsel for the defendant.

Davis is Dead Game—Sheriff Shutt, of Morrow county, left this afternoon with James Davis, the man who is wanted in Heppner, Oregon, for obtaining money under false pretenses. Davis is taking his medicine in fine shape, and says nothing regarding his future predicament. Sheriff Shutt and Sheriff Minto are of the opinion that Davis has been in the business in which he met his downfall for some time, and that there are not many tricks turned but what he is an artist at.

Object to Rock Crusher—The southeast part of the city was well represented at the boosters' meeting in the Yew Park house last night. The whole evening was taken up discussing the removal of the rock crusher, located on South Winter street, to some place outside the city limits. Attorney Thomas Brown, Walter Lennon, A. J. Basey and other citizens living in the vicinity of the crusher, made the principal talks, showing the disagreeable and unsanitary conditions which the people who live in that locality have to endure. Nearly every one present was in favor of having the crusher moved. A committee was appointed to present the matter to the city council, and if that body fails to act private citizens will take the matter into their own hands.

Railroad Commission Matters—The Railroad Commission received an answer from the Northern Pacific Company this morning to their letter of inquiry regarding a telegraph station at St. Johns. The railroad company state they do not think it necessary to construct a telegraph station in St. Johns, as the business there is not sufficient to warrant the company making such an improvement, and that arrangements have been made for an experienced man to attend to all business in that locality without the telegraph station. A complaint was filed with the commission to see that the Northern Pacific people construct a telegraph station in their territory. Elmer T. Connel has filed a formal complaint

with the Railroad Commission against the Northern Pacific Company, asking that stock pens and chutes be installed at Deer Island. The commission will take the matter up with the officials immediately.

Laborers Wanted—Salem was never so shy of workmen as it is today. Laborers are in demand everywhere. The street departments, cop yards, farms, wood yards, every place is calling for workmen, and until the demand is supplied many industries are "hung up."

Davis Had a Wad—Sheriff Minto, upon searching James Davis, the green goods man, found a trifle over \$700 on his person which he turned over to the Sheriff of Morrow county, who in turn will deliver it back to the Heppner Bank.

Suicide at Asylum—James Toovillon, aged 55 years, committed suicide at the asylum last night, by taking strychnine. He had been in the asylum 18 years and was a trusty.
