Supreme Court Matters—
The Supreme Court is in session today and a large number of attorneys from Marshfield, Coos County, are present. The attorneys are arguing the Ferri vs. Beaver Hill Coal Company case. This is a case where F. Ferri, a minor, sustained personal injuries as the result of being caught and injured by a string of moving mining cars. He was given judgment in the sum of \$6,000. The attorneys are Clark, Blake, Liljequist, Goss, Sherwood and R. W. Wilbur. They will also argue another case, that of Able vs. Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern Railroad & Navigation Company. Able was a brakeman on the road and received personal injuries for which he was given judgment. 4-7-4t

RAILROAD NOT LIABLE IF YOU RIDE ON ENGINE

Olympia, Wash., April 8.—The supreme court has affirmed the King County superior court in the decision that John K. Fischer cannot recover from the Columbia & Puget Sound Railroad for injuries sustained in a train wreck. Fischer rode in the locomotive upon the invitation of the engineer and when the brakes later failed to work, he jumped from the swiftly running train at the engineer's suggestion and was seriously hurt. 4-7-4t

Both courts held that Fischer had no business on the engine and the invitation of the engineer did not bind the company. 4-7-4t

Officer Jory kept his eye on the carriage and when it drew up in front of one of the houses near Chinatown, promptly put the man who threw the bottle under arrest. Throwing broken glass upon the streets is against the laws of the city, and John Doe, being subject to punishment for keeping late hours in connection with his other misdemeanor, will lay out a few days in the city jail and have a chance to reason with himself. Throwing glass and other objectionable articles in the streets while riding in carriages behind curtains, has been done frequently by persons in hilarious mood, but in the future the officers are going to keep a sharp look out for all these offenders and arrest them. 4-7-4t
