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MOUNTAIN WATER FOR CITY AND STATE

The Capital Water Commission was organized through the action of the Salem Board of Trade and Business Men's League, and is composed of fifteen of the most prominent and progressive citizens, including the governor of the state who is chairman of the commission. Since his promotion to the United States Senate, Governor Chamberlain has been succeeded by Governor Frank W. Benson, who has expressed a willingness to serve the city and state in this important matter of bringing in mountain water for the Capital City and state institutions.

City Council Acts.

The Salem City Council appropriated \$1,500 to make the preliminary surveys and get all the data necessary to bring the matter up for action by the city. The City Council employed Engineer Culver to represent the city in this matter and that gentleman, who is familiar with all the ground between Salem and the sources of pure water in the forest reserve, has made a preliminary survey and reported to the council. The next step will be to make an estimate of the cost of bringing in water, and also get at the value of the present water company plan, which will probably be done by arbitration, in which the city, the state and the water corporation will each employ an engineer to arrive at the value of the property. The city election in Eugene turned on the subject of municipal ownership of pure mountain water, and the water program was carried by a large majority.

Engineer Culver's Report.

The orderly steps taken toward the securing of mountain water for Salem are shown in the report of Civil Engineer Culver to the mountain water committee.

Mr. Culver was engaged to make a survey upon which to base an estimate of the cost of a mountain water system. He reports as follows:

"In accordance with our agreement I have the following report to make for the month of March regarding the progress of the work of surveying for an estimate on the cost of a supply of mountain water for the city of Salem. I have prepared maps showing the ownership of property, location of streams, county roads and towns along the route within the watershed of the two streams under consideration.

"I have had surveys made showing the location and elevation of the present reservoir and adjacent points suitable for reservoir sites and also of the reform school, mute school, and asylum farm buildings, and have run a line of levels from Salem through Turner, Tiayton, Mehama, Mill City, and Niagara to the Breitenbush river and have also run a line from the mouth of the North Fork of the Santiam river up to the Taylor bridge, a distance of two and one-half miles. This line is yet to be completed.

"Other maps and drawings have been made, all of which are necessary in working out the details of the estimate.

"The report is now in the hands of the council."

ARBOR DAY AT GRANT SCHOOL

For two weeks the pupils, janitor and teachers, together with patrons of Grant school, have been working to do something practical toward beautifying the school premises.

Two beds prepared for geraniums, besides a few scattering plants, as columbine, peony, chrysanthemums and heliotrope.

Janitor Hensel worked among the patrons, and, besides securing liberal contributions, is entitled to credit for the success of the undertaking. It being begun at his earnest request. The police, however, held the crowd in check and escorted the woman for several blocks along Fifth avenue, out of harm's way.
