HOW FRUIT FARMING PAYS

In collecting reports for the census the United States government classified all farms according to the principal source of income from the farm. Where the income from any particular source equaled or exceeded 40 per cent of the total income, that source determined the classification of the farm. Thus, in case 40 per cent of the income was received from vegetables, it was called a vegetable farm.

The horticultural farms were listed under the four sources of income, vegetables, fruits, flowers and plants, nursery products. These farms had a total acreage of 16,514,705 acres, valued at \$1,058,464,499, an average per acre of \$64.10. The average value of all farms is only \$24.39 per acre. See the difference?

The acreage of all farms is fifty-one times as great as the acreage of horticultural farms, while the value of all farm property is only nineteen times as great as the value of horticultural property, and the average value per acre for all farms is only three-eighths of the average for horticultural farms.

The same report shows that the average income per acre from horticultural farms is more than three times the average income per acre of other farms.

The census report shows that the percentage of farms under tenure of tenants is smaller with horticultural farms than with farms of any other class. Almost 90 per cent of the horticultural farms of the country are operated by their owners, as against 33 per cent of cotton farms, 52 per cent of tobacco farms, 61 per cent of hay and grain farms, etc.
