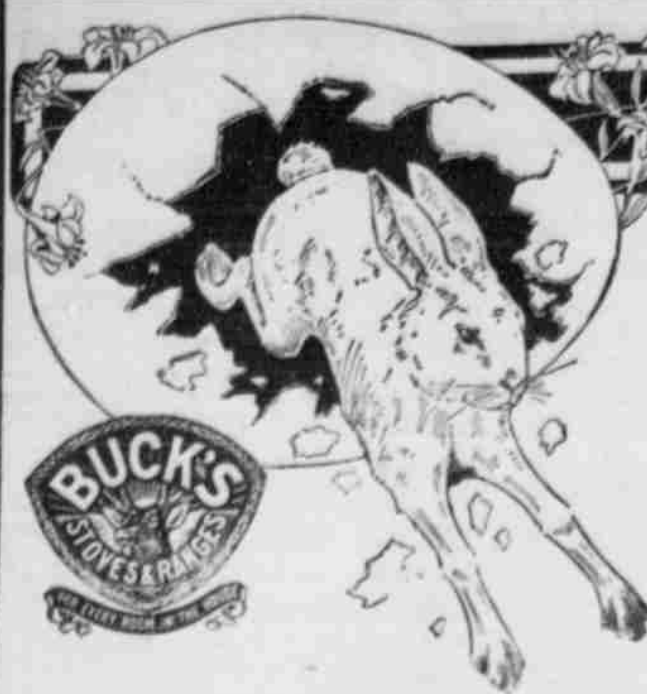

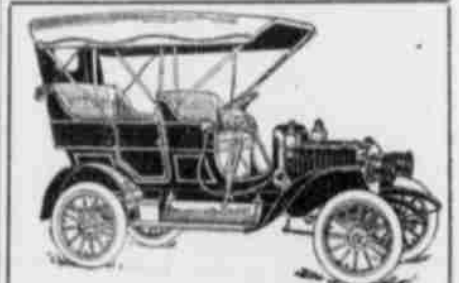
OLD LINCOLN FARM TO BE DIVIDED

EVANS POTATO PLANTERS

This machine is one of our new specialties, and, without doubt, is the most improved machine of its class on the market, being strictly up-to-date in every particular. In designing this machine the inventor has taken every care to accomplish all that has been accomplished by the machines now on the market, and to more thoroughly perfect the features that are now defective on the types of machines now built.

The Feed—This being the most important part in seeding machines, and especially so in potato planters, we have constructed the feed so that there is no adjustment for large or small pieces of potato. It is a force-feed, and is positive in its action, and its operation is controlled by the machine, instead of by the size of the seed potatoes. The difficulty experienced with the earlier machines now on the market was that they required constant adjustment to suit the size of the pieces of potato, and if the pieces were of irregular size, the dropping would be more or less imperfect. This will be readily appreciated by those who have used the old style potato planter.

A RECORD OF 12 ACRES PLANTED WITH THE EVANS AND NOT A MISSED HILL

The Hand Lever—This machine is controlled by a simple and effective hand lever, which governs the depth of planting and covering, and is readily changed by the operator without leaving his seat. The covering shovels are supported on a flat U-shaped spring, which is connected to the furrow runner, and the shovels are raised or lowered by the hand lever. The U-shaped springs make the covering shovels flexible allowing them to yield to the unequal surface of the ground, causing them to of the seed potatoes. The difficult-tached without springs. The hand lever is also used for raising the furrow runner when turning around, which is a great advantage over machines having no hand lever.

To Change the Distances Apart in Dropping—The machine will drop the potato in drills, 10, 12, 14, 16, 18, 20, 22 or 36 inches apart. The change for the different distances apart is accomplished by putting on more or fewer picker arms. The number of arms to be used is shown in plain figures on the disc to which the picker arms are attached, so there can be no mistake made in changing the machine to plant the proper distance.

The Driver Can See the Potatoes Dropping—This is a great advantage, as he then knows whether the machine is depositing the seed properly or not, and can detect the fact of the machine being out of potatoes as soon as it occurs.
