GREAT OLD HOSTELRY, IS SOLD

WILLAMETTE HOTEL, KNOWN BY ALL OREGONIANS HAS CHANGED HANDS

The oldest hotel in the Willamette Valley, and which was in its day the grandest enterprise of the kind in the state, known for many years as the Chemeketa, and of late years as the Willamette Hotel, a verbally reported sold to syndicate of Salem capitalists for \$37,000. It is reported that Mr. Br. Bush made the sale and the deeds will be executed as soon as they can be prepared. Already parties are trying to buy off pieces of the half block, including the Electric Company's shops, and the old livery stable. A petition was started to pave Liberty street to Ferry with bitulithic, and the price of the property on the opposite corner has gone up several thousand.

Who Put Up the Money.
W. R. Byrd, \$5,000; T. B. Kay, \$5,000; Steusloff Bros., \$10,000; Catlin & Linn, \$10,000; James Wilson, \$3,000; Mr. Thompson, \$2,500; total, \$37,500. Fred C. Fish has a lease on the property until March 1, 1910. The Electric Co. has a lease until August 1. It is not the intention of the owners to make this into anything like the \$100,000 hotel that has been talked of, as they have bought it just as a good speculation, and they may spend \$20,000 to \$30,000 to make it a good first-class second-class hotel.

The removal of the old Willamette makes a first-class hotel proposition easier, as many refused to take stock so long as that was in the way. The present buy is a bargain for any purpose, and the owners may sell it a week after they get their deed recorded.
