## STAYTON BANKERS HAVE A FEW VERY STRENUOUS MOMENTS

### SULTAN GAINING POWER

IS AGAIN THE REAL RULER OF TURKEY, AND THE YOUNG TURKS ARE RAPIDLY LOSING THEIR HOLD ON THE PEOPLE—MANY ARE KILLED.

### TROOPS QUIETED

Fears Are Entertained That the Soldiers Who Object to Tewfik Pasha as Grand Vizier, Will Again Mutiny—Sultan May Be Assassinated.

Constantinople, via Philippopolis, Bulgaria, April 14.—More than fifty persons have been slain since the present trouble began and reaction-

ary uprisings are reported today at Alehh, Damascus, Uskub, and practically throughout Albania, but comparative quiet reigns here, the new minister of war having finally persuaded the mutinous troops to return to their barracks. The situation here is none the less serious for the temporary lull in the storm, but hostilities have been deferred for a short time.

Danger of fresh trouble developed today when the military expressed its opposition to Tewfik Pasha, the grand vizier who succeeded Hilmi. As long as this opposition remains there will be no possibility of establishing a stable government.

The real ruler of Turkey today is the Sultan, who is working through the League of Mohammed. He is rapidly assuming his old grasp of Asia and it is feared that if he is completely restored to power he will wreak terrible vengeance upon the Liberals.

The young Turks have sworn to kill the Sultan if he swings too far towards the opposition. Wild rumors are afloat on the street today that the Sultan has been murdered, but these stories are discredited.

It is expected that the new cabinet will be announced within a few hours. Besides Ahmed Pasha, the new minister of war, the only appointment yet confirmed is that of Rifat Pasha who will continue in office as minister of foreign affairs.

### AFRAID OF GUN

Claimed by Posse That One of the Robbers was Wounded and Man With Bullet Wound in Arm Arrested at Munkers Station This Morning.

At 2:15 p. m. yesterday two masked men walked into the Stayton bank and leveled their guns at the head of that institution, W. L. Freres. They demanded "hands up" from the two men behind the counter, and proceeded to hold up the institution in approved Younger Brothers style. The men had big ugly revolvers and were closely masked. Their masks prevented their seeing just what had become of Peter Freres, who had apparently dropped through the floor. Not a sight or sound of this agile member of the family of Freres Bros. could be discovered. The men on the other side of the counter never said a word, but stood with their guns leveled on W. L. Freres and his assistant. But the mysterious disappearance of Peter alarmed them, and at the end of two minutes the robbers, covering the bank people with their guns, began to slowly back out, darted across the street, cut across lots and were gone into the woods on the north bank of the river before anyone could get the drop on them. In the meantime Peter had got hold of a gun on the underside of the counter, where he had dropped in hiding.

titude say the malcontentis, by Dr. E. W. King, superintendent of the hospital.

Miss Honn is charged by the striking women, with incompetency and unfairness, and the trouble reached a crisis upon the alleged refusal of the superintendent to properly investigate the charges preferred against her by the attendants in a position to the board of managers.

According to the statements of the insurrectionists, Matron Honn was partially and unfairly in her administration. It is claimed that she made many mistakes in the attendant's time checks, and that several nurses suffered financially for her carelessness.

King, the young women claim, always sided with the matron. They also aver that he is under the influence of the matron and Steward A. C. Handy. They say that the petition requesting an investigation of their charges against Miss Honn, placed before the board early last month was referred to Dr. King, and that his investigation was most perfunctory. The board gave King jurisdiction in the matter and he replied to the petitioners that their were unsubstantiated.

King, who is nearly 80 years old, has refused to talk of the alleged incompetency of Miss Honn.

All of the young women who left the hospital have homes in this city and most of them have been employed at the hospital for years. Sympathy seems to be with the strikers on account of abuse to the patients confined in the hospital.

### UNION PACIFIC GETS INTO ABERDEEN

Aberdeen, Wash., April 14.—The Union Pacific Railroad has at last secured entrance to Aberdeen, when by the purchase of the property on which work on the proposed buildings of the Vulcan Iron Works has been under way.

The first intimation that the railroad had secured this property, which has long been desired by it for the north approach to the Chehalis river bridge, was given today when the building operations on it were ordered suspended. The road considered it absolutely necessary that it should be acquired in order to make extension to Aberdeen. Dirt will fly fast from now on in constructing the line.

### SEATTLE TO HAVE GREAT TRACK MEET

Seattle, Wash., April 14.—The biggest amateur sporting event held in Seattle for years will take place on May 7th, in the new armory, under the auspices of the Seattle Athletic Club, the track and field athletes of the Northwest will participate in an indoor meet.

Besides the best runners and jumpers in the local clubs and the Y. M. C. A.'s of Seattle, Portland, Spokane and perhaps Victoria and Vancouver, the colleges of the Northwest will be asked to send relay teams, as will the high schools of the Puget Sound country.

Dan Kelly, who two years ago, set a new record of 33.5 seconds in the 100 yard dash, will be seen in the sprints and jumps. Forrest Smithson, winner of the 110-metre hurdle at the Olympic games, will also be seen in action here. He will compete, like Kelly, for the Multnomah Club, of Portland.

### FULTON MAY YET BE APPOINTED

Washington, April 14.—President Taft will pay no heed to protests from Chinamen in this country against the appointment of Charles W. Fulton, former United States senator from Oregon, to be minister to China, the post offered him by the President.

This information was obtained from a person close to the administration. He declared that President Taft learned from the Chinese government, before offering the position to Fulton, that the former Oregon senator would be welcome over there, in the event of his appointment. The President wanted to be doubly sure of this, so that he would know of a certainty that no embarrassment would rise if the ministryship was accepted.

### GREAT BALL SEASON

NATIONAL LEAGUE BEGAN ITS WORK TODAY—THOUSANDS OF CRAZY FANS ATTEND OPENING GAME AT CHICAGO THIS AFTERNOON.

### "CUBS" VS ST LOUIS

At Detroit the "Tigers" and "White Sox"—Rains in Philadelphia and Washington Will Probably Cut Out the Games at Those Places.

Chicago, April 14.—With a clear sky above thousands of crazy fans clamoring for admittance at the West Side grounds, everything is auspicious for the opening game this afternoon of what promises to be the greatest season this baseball-mad nation has ever known.

The opening of the National League season here today will be attended by the annual ceremonies, after which Chance and his wonderful Cubs will trot on the field to do battle with Roger Bresnahan and his nondescript St. Louis crew. At the same hour Cincinnati and Pittsburg will clash on the grounds of the former, while at Boston Bowerman and his Beaneaters will meet Philadelphia. In New York rain fell all morning, and it is feared that the opening necessarily will be postponed.

Though four of the teams have been doing a few preliminary skirmishes, the season in the American League will be launched today also.

At Detroit the Tigers are at home to Billy Sullivan's White Sox. Such an attraction for an opening day is sufficient in itself to draw out one of the largest crowds that ever witnessed a game in the Michigan city. Cleveland meets St. Louis on the latter's home grounds, and the performances of these teams will be watched with the greatest interest all over the continent. Obnoxious rains in Philadelphia and Washington will probably result in "no games" in those cities.

### SOCIETY WOMEN OBJECT TO HOSPITAL

Seattle, Wash., April 14.—The attempt to start construction on the proposed tuberculosis camp in the fashionable Queen Ann Hill district has resulted in failure, owing to the opposition of the women of the neighborhood, who turned out yesterday afternoon to the number of 40 or 50 and drove the lumber wagons off the field and the foreman in charge of the work into the nearby brush.

When the vanguard of the lumber caravan reached the proposed site, the gathering of the clans from neighboring residences began. Armed with brooms, mopsticks and sundry awful and wonderful offensive and defensive weapons, a mob of women surrounded the grounds and demanded that he unload his lumber elsewhere.

The driver expostulated. He could not help it, he said. Offensive taunting of several brooms in his face served to change his mind, however, and he drove away.

When the man with the blueprints arrived to select the site, he was beset with such suddenness and earnestness by the mob that he was glad to make his escape without tarrying to argue the question.

It is contended by those who live near the proposed camp that the location of the tuberculosis camp will depreciate the value of their property and make the neighborhood undesirable.

At a meeting of the residents of the district, held last night, legal council was engaged and was resolved to fight the establishment of the sanitarium through the courts.
