**TWEEDY AND M'CARTY**  
**GET LIGHT SENTENCE**

At 9 o'clock this morning Judge Burnett called court and opened business by sentencing Wm. Tweedy and Alex. McCarthy, convicted of the crime of contributing to the delinquency of a delinquent minor. Tweedy was given 30 days in the county jail and McCarthy 20 days, the state to recover all costs and disbursements.

Judge Burnett, in addressing the lawyers and their clients, said, in substance that, owing to the action of the girls in question prior to the time at which the offense was committed, being disorderly and subject to criticism, barring them from decent society for the time being, and the condition in which the families of McCarthy and Tweedy would be placed should the full limit of the law be exercised, he ought if the proper procedure to take in being lenient with the defendants in the case. There were also several technicalities which Judge Burnett cited on the case, take principally from the decisions of the higher courts handed down in relation to the title of the action at hand.

Both Tweedy and McCarthy were turned over to Sheriff Minto and placed in the county jail.
