Chicago, April 16.—Hugh Crab, formerly confidential agent of the late L. Z. Leiter, today is facing a court order to pay Miss Mary Matthes \$25,000 for alleged breach of promise.

BLAME THE HOLY ROLLERS FOR DEATH OF VETERAN IN SAN JOSE

San Jose, Cal., April 16.—Residents of the vicinity of the Holy Roller's home in this city are up in arms because of the death at the "home" of John Shaw, an aged veteran of the civil war.

It is stated that many of the neighbors of the peculiar sect are preparing evidence for District Attorney Free, which will show that Shaw suffered from a gripe for four days, and that the Rollers, with whom he was stopping, refused to permit him medical aid.

According to the statement of John Buck, a friend of the old man, Shaw had \$350 which the Roller elders endeavored to persuade him to give to the sect. He was counseled by Buck to keep the money.

Buck further stated that when Shaw became seriously ill he attempted to secure him medical assistance. This procedure, however, was not countenanced by the elders, who gathered around the death bed and raved and prayed in their peculiar manner for the purification of the dying man's soul.

"Keep your hands off of him," they are said to have stated, "Prayer will cure him, and when he is purified he will be given the gift of tongues."

The Rollers were the subject of no little discussion here two months ago, when they barricaded their hall and held captive Miss Daisy Moore, a pretty schoolteacher, whose mind had become affected by the tumultuous forms of religion practiced by them.

would have escaped from the building uninjured.

Kroeger displayed his absolute lack of fear throughout the time he assisted the work of rescue. At the very moment when the walls of the burning building started to collapse, he dashed back into the fire and dragged two men to a place of safety.

Fire Marshal Towe gave out the following statement:

"The cause of the fire is unknown. It started on the second floor of the rooming house and was probably caused by a defective flue."

"The place, while complying with the letter of the law governing buildings, was a firetrap pure and simple. Its hallways and entrances were barely up to the standard, and the former were so winding that in darkness or a time of excitement, the exits could hardly be found."

John W. Shanahan has had a great deal of trouble with the authorities regarding the St. George, which he owned, and on December 13, 1906, was arrested for violating the building ordinance.

Forty lodgers in the St. George had not been accounted for at noon.
