FOND HIS BABY DROWNED IN PUDDLE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Seattle, Wash., April 17.—George Clark, a blacksmith at Woodville, is almost insane from the shock he received last evening when he found the body of his own child in a pool of water near his shop. Clark was on his way home when he saw floating on the surface of the water strands of what appeared to be the hair of a doll.

Stopping to pick it up, Clark was horrified to drag forth his own little daughter, five years old. The hole where the child was drowned is only about a yard wide and two or three feet in depth, and it is supposed the little girl fell into the water while on her way to her father's shop.
