W. W. SKINNER CROSSES THE GREAT DIVIDE

In the passing of William Skinner, another link connecting the present with the past has snapped. For nearly 40 years he has been connected with the Southern Pacific, and was, in fact, connected with the road in the old Ben Holliday days. For some years he was a member of the Salem council, and was mayor for one term. Able, genial, generous, he gathered to himself a host of warm personal friends, and when his summons came Saturday to go over to the majority many eyes unused to tears, were moist. He was first employed at Roseburg, and in 1874 came to Salem, where for 25 years he had practically the entire control of the company's business. In later years he was relieved of much of his responsibility, but remained a thoroughly trusted employee up to last September, when, in appreciation of his long and capable service, he was retired on a pension.

He was born in Ohio 73 years ago, and is survived by his widow, one son, William, now in Spokane, and one daughter, Mrs. H. O'Neill, of Nevada.

The funeral will be from the Rigdon undertaking parlors at 4 p. m. Wednesday afternoon. There will be no flowers, but those who follow the body of their old friend to its last resting place will leave the tribute of tears, and keep in sweet remembrance the memory of a life-long friend.

ty jail at Ada at 3 o'clock this morning by a mob of one hundred persons and hanged in a barn at the rear of the prison. The victims were Jesse West, Joseph Allen, B. B. Burrell, Jos. B. Miller. The rich cattle men were held on the charge of killing Marshal A. A. Bott on February 27. Bott was very popular and feeling has run high ever since he was killed. The mob quietly surrounded the jail and overpowered a deputy sheriff who had been left on guard. This man did not have the desired keys, however, and the jail was partially battered down before the four men were taken from their cells.

The victims were led to the barn, which was not far from the jail. Ropes had been prepared and the four victims, after being bound hand and foot, were stood in a row. The nooses were placed about their necks and ropes thrown over the rafters. Then all four were hanged together, and as soon as they were dead the mob quietly dispersed. The officers did not find the bodies until daylight. It is understood that the prisoners bragged that they would not be convicted and had intimated that their money would free them. This, it is said, aroused the ire of the friends of the murdered officer, who deliberately planned the lynching and carried it out with marked precision.
