There is also an opportunity opened for some of Salem's retired capitalists to aid, perhaps the best effort ever made to better the condition of those who are trying to help themselves to a higher and better plane of American civilization.

BENSON LAND FRAUD CASE AGAIN

Washington, April 20.—After having secured a jury, Justice Gould, in the criminal court, is ready today to proceed with the trial of John A. Benson, of San Francisco, accused of bribery in connection with defrauding the government out of valuable forest reserve lands in Washington and California.

After waiving the reading of the indictment against him late yesterday, Benson, through his attorneys, attempted to escape trial on the ground of his acquittal on former charges of conspiracy. Those charges involved Henry P. Diamond, Frederick A. Hyde and Joost H. Schneider, District Attorney Baker's demurrer was sustained and the defense allowed and exception.
