COLONEL ROOSEVELT SCEPTICAL OF JUNGLES FINDS EVIDENCES OF CIVILIZATION AND DINNER CLUBS IN AFRICA

Mombassa, British East Africa, April 22.—There are so many evidences of civilization everywhere that I am beginning to be skeptical as to the existence of the jungles," said Colonel Roosevelt at a spread in his honor at the Dinner Club. But he will see antelopes and ostriches in a day or so, and will have some fine practice on small game, as the plans of the party were changed today and Roosevelt will spend a week hunting on the Kapiti Plains, where he will camp.

The dinner at the club was one of the most interesting features of the tour so far. It took on an international phase, when F. C. Selous ex-

pressed the opinion that Colonel Roosevelt's visit might be the means of erecting better relations between England and Germany. This statement brought forth great applause. Roosevelt was cheered for three minutes when he arose to make a brief speech, in which he expressed his gratitude and made a number of remarks about his efforts to reach the jungles, and his constantly being provided with all the comforts of home.

The party left here at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon and will disembark tonight after a short rest. The hunting on the plain will probably start tomorrow. At the end of the week's sport Roosevelt will go to the ranch of Sir Alfred Pease, which he first planned to visit immediately.

LOSES HER FORTUNE AND STEALS BREAD

New York, April 22.—After losing her fortune of \$75,000 at race tracks and in pool rooms, Mrs. Anna Trafford, widow of John Trafford, a Peruvian mining promoter, today is in the toils of the law. Mrs. Trafford was arrested on a charge of stealing a loaf of bread and a bottle of milk, with which to break a fast of many days.

According to the story the woman told to Magistrate Tighe, her husband left her a small fortune upon his death three years ago, and in an effort to forget her sorrows, she frequented a local race track. She lost heavily, and when track betting was stopped here, she attempted to recoup her losses in the pool rooms. Hungry and homeless, she is said to have followed a bakery delivery man into a basement, and to have taken a loaf of bread and a bottle of milk which she found. She was held for trial in the special sessions court.

LILLIAN NORDICA BATTLES IN COURTS

Boston, Mass., April 22.—It was announced here today that Mme. Lillian Nordica is determined to fight out in the supreme court the battle over the will of the late Mrs. Vannie Allen, which is being contested in the Middlesex county probate court. According to George C. Hall, of Malden, who drew up Mrs. Allen's will, a request was made by Mrs. Allen's late husband, John W. Allen, that none of his money should be left to Mme. Nordica, because she already had money enough. Others who fell under the ban of Allen and his wife Mrs. Imogene Cortello, of Los Angeles; Mrs. Anna M. Harte, of Boston; and Mrs. Ione Walker, of New York.

Judge McIntyre has transferred the case to the supreme court for jury trial.

FALLS FIVE STORIES AND IS STILL ALIVE

Portland, Or., April 22.—To fall five stories and still be alive, with every prospect of recovering, is the remarkable experience of John Billingslaw, 25 years old, who is today the center of interest at St. Vincent's hospital.

The young man was working late yesterday afternoon on the roof of a new hotel annex being constructed here, when he stumbled and fell. Five stories below, on the top of an adjoining building, he landed flat on his back, the full force of the impact being received on the shoulders.

Fellow workmen soon reached his side, expecting to find his body mangled. Much to their surprise, Billingslaw was still breathing, and not fatally injured. His clothing was split down the back as if by a knife.

DAUGHTER OF RICH MAGNATE RUNS OFF

Chicago, April 22.—Desiring to avoid the notoriety of a church wedding, and its consequent pomp and ceremony, Edmund J. Doering, Jr., son of a prominent physician of this city, and Miss Edna Jeffery, daughter of Edward T. Jeffery, president of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, eloped to Milwaukee yesterday afternoon. None of the members of the families of the young couple opposed the match, and considerable surprise was expressed that the wedding plans were conducted with so much secrecy. When the announcement of the marriage was made by Doering the reason for the quiet wedding was that, owing to the illness of the bride's mother, the ceremony was private.

The bride and groom have known each other since childhood. Both have traveled extensively through Europe, and Doering has spent most of his life abroad.

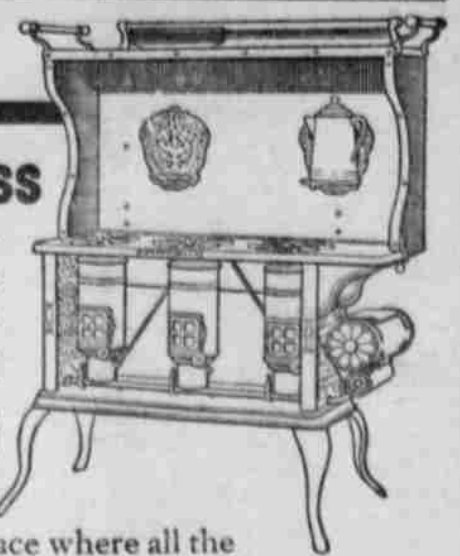

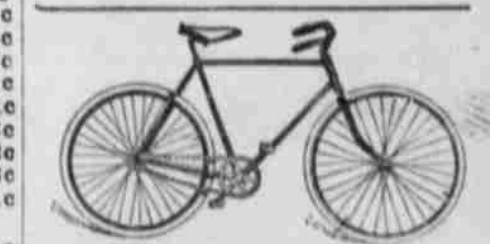
