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SALEM VERSUS PORTLAND

What promises to be some classy ball is the game now scheduled between the Salem Independent team and the White Diamonds, of Portland. The contest will be pulled off on the Asylum avenue ball park next Sunday afternoon, and owing to the team from Portland being composed of mostly former Tri-City League players, the Salem aggregation will be compelled to work much faster than they did when playing the Fairmount team last Sunday.

Salem fans will remember the East Portland team which played in the city several times last season, and they will also remember what kind of ball was played by them and how they trounced the Salem Cherry Pickers in good style. With the exception of a few players, the White Diamonds are composed of the old East Portlanders. Nevertheless, Managers Jerman and Heyners, of the local team, are confident they will be in on the game just the same, and the manner in which they are lining up the team here East Portland will have nothing to walk away with. Southpaw Chet Bowen will be in the box next Sunday, which will be a great help to the team.

John Humphreys, one of Salem's most promising and speedy young players of base ball, will again be given charge of the third sack Sunday. Humphreys, although being in base ball prominence only two seasons, is gaining quite a reputation and if he keeps up the pace which he is traveling at present, Salem may be represented in the Pacific Coast League before many seasons have gone by. Roberts who has proven himself to be a real, dyed-in-the-wool around ball artist at any point of the game and who is looked upon by exponents of base ball criticism as being a "corner" in future, will play short stop for the independents Sunday. This youngster has been stationed all over the diamond heretofore and always makes good.

Fred Heyner will have charge of the catching job again. Heyner's ability is not questioned in this city as he has shown what he can do behind the stick.

Jones, Jerman and Ott will play field. This makes a cracker-jack of an outfield and a good speedy trio of fielders are always run savers.

The Salem team is now prepared to play any and all teams within a reasonable distance and can also assure the public good speedy, interesting ball. WELL KNOWN MAN IN SHOE TRADE BUYS OUT C. G. GIVEN

M. Bloom, who was in business at Salem five years ago under the firm name of P. Manfred & Co., has bought out the G. G. Given shoe stock and has a two-years' lease on a very fine central location in the First National Bank block. He went from Salem to San Francisco and was in the big earthquake, burning up and losing all he had. Then he was caught in the Trust Company bank failure, and sold out his place on Market and Sixth street and removed to Oregon City. He ran a shoe business there a year, and has now located in Salem. Mr. Bradford, who was with Mr. Given for several years, will remain with the new firm. Mr. Bloom will overhaul the stock and get it in shape to make some offers to the public on the line of running a strictly cash store at cut prices.

WASHINGTON SELLS 3,000,000 GRAIN BAGS

Olympia, April 23.—Governor Hay, after consulting with the members of the state board of control, has issued directions that Superintendent Reed and State Clerk McCallum start out as traveling men to dispose of the 3,000,000 grain bags made at the state penitentiary. The state authorities also decided to make a price of 6 cents delivered at any station in the state.

This will enable the grain growers in remote counties to get bags at the same price paid by Walla Walla growers.

This plan is expected to move every sack on hand and all that will be manufactured this year, and to bring into the state treasury more than \$175,000.
