RELIC OF PIONEER TIMES PART OF PLOW USED BY PHIL SHERIDAN SENT TO SALEM

A. G. Magers yesterday received a rather interesting relic of Oregon's pioneer days, it being a heavy oak moldboard on the plow used by General Phil Sheridan, at that time a lieutenant, on the Grand Ronde Indian reservation. There were no disc plows in those days, and in fact none of the fine plows which the farmers of these days find necessary, and yet do not fully appreciate. The moldboard is from two to four inches thick, made of a piece of Oregon oak. It was originally provided with a cutter or front made from a wagon tire, but this has been lost, and only the wood remains. It still has the wooden plugs by which it was fastened to the plow frame and is in a fine state of preservation. That old plow turned the soil in the early '50s that not only furnished vegetables and grain for the post but undoubtedly furnished lots of provender that in the hard winters kept the aboriginal's backbone from getting too familiar with the covering of his abdomen. Its a far cry from the old wooden moldboard to the modern gang plow, and this old plow used by a youngster in the American army long before he attained fame or was the subject of poetry because he was "twenty miles away," is surely one of the things worthy of mention and of being taken from a private collection to add to the wealth of the big collection of early days being gathered by the Pioneer Association.
