Sixth—The new graded lessons, which are to be ready for use in these departments next October.

County Sunday Schools.

The afternoon session began at 1:30 by devotional exercises conducted by Rev. Geoffrey, of Salem. Miss Nolan, of Salem, gave a practical demonstration of a class exercise with a class of beginners. Rev. F. E. Billington, of Silverton, presented an address on "How It Was Done, and How It Can Be Done." Miss Evans, of Salem, gave a demonstration of primary class methods. Mrs. Lucy F. Addison, of Lents, gave an address on "The Temperance Lesson." Mrs. Mary Foster Bryner, of Chicago, spoke most interestingly on "The Practical Side of the Sunday School to the Community, to the State, to the Church."

Thursday Morning.

The morning session of the convention was opened by a song service and devotional exercises, led by Rev. D. T. Thomas, at 9 o'clock.

IS ARRESTED FOR MURDERING HIS WIFE

Sacramento, April 29.—Floyd D. Carter, under indictment for the murder of his bride of six months, is in jail here today awaiting trial. Carter was brought here yesterday from St. Louis, where he was captured on board an incoming train.

Mrs. Verna Phipps Carter, the murdered woman, was found dead in bed in a lodging house here last January with three bullet holes in her body. Her husband mysteriously disappeared but was traced to St. Louis, where he was arrested. He declares he is innocent of the crime, but gives no reason for his hasty departure from this city after the discovery of his wife's body.

TORNADO BUSY IN KANSAS

CROSSES THE BORDER AND VISITS OKLAHOMA

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Douglas, Kans., April 29.—One man is dead and a number of others are reported to be seriously injured as a result of a tornado which swept the southern part of Butler county today.

The storm wrecked a number of buildings, tore up trees and created general havoc. No estimate of the property loss has been made, but it is known to be exceedingly heavy.

Louise Ayres, aged 70 years, was the victim of the storm. He was so frightened by the tornado that he died of heart disease after it had passed.

Swept Into Oklahoma.

Tupelo, Okla., April 29.—The fruit crop is severely damaged as the result of a tornado which hit this section of the country last night. A number of buildings were wrecked, but no loss of life has been reported.

Telephone and telegraph wires were torn down by the storm, and it is impossible to learn the extent of the damage done. Meagre reports received here, however, indicate that the loss is heavy.

ARNOLD DENIES BEING A FAKIR

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, April 29.—"I am not a Hindoo priest or a seer or a mystic, or anything like those things. I am a plain mining broker," said O. H. Arnold, who is held at the city prison today on a charge of grand larceny preferred by Mrs. Lillian Ross, wife of T. Patterson Ross, an architect of this city.

Arnold, who is believed by the police to have operated under the names of Al Gar and Dugan, is charged with obtaining from Mrs. Ross jewels and property valued at \$6000 while she was under his tutelage in the rites of Hindoo mysticism and clairvoyance, declares that he knows nothing of the property and is innocent of the charge. He was brought here from Los Angeles yesterday by Detective Hunter after escaping from that city in an automobile to avoid habeas corpus proceedings. Mrs. Ross is now in Los Angeles and has announced her intention of returning to this city at an early date to prosecute the alleged swindler.

It developed today that Detective Hunter and Froel, acting under orders of former Chief of Police Biggy, investigated the disappearance of the jewels last summer. Arnold and his wife, said to be living under the names of Mr. and Mrs. Al Gar at that time, are alleged to have been implicated in the theft with Amer Dutt, a Hindoo priest at Oakland. Dutt, soon after the investigation started, left for the east, and the Al Gars are supposed to have gone to Los Angeles. A search of the warehouses of Los Angeles is said to have resulted in the recovery of some of the missing property. The police believe that the greater part of the loot was shipped to Chicago.

Arnold has retained the services of Attorney James W. Cochran, who will defend him in the courts.

ABOUT THAT HINGES HOLD-UP

When A. J. Smith, who undertook to relieve Chas. Hinges of some of his valuables last Tuesday, was brought before Judge Wiley A. Moores this morning for his arraignment, he waived examination and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$1000. No bonds were furnished Smith and he was locked up in the county jail. The luckless man was in an enfeebled condition this morning, having passed a very restless night. The officers have been considerate, however, of his poor health and do not hesitate to do anything in their power to make him easy.

In this connection it may be said that the story printed in The Journal to the effect that Smith had a room over the Hinges store was a mistake, nor had there been any change of locks, as Mr. A. C. Smith, father of the boy, has had the rooms rented for months. The adjoining room had a changed lock, but not the Smith room. It looks now as though the whole affair was the freak of an entirely irresponsible man.

HAND LEMON GROWERS A GREAT BIG LEMON

Chicago, April 29.—The efforts of the California lemon growers to secure the assistance of the railroads in their fight for a tariff on citrus fruits are said today to have met with no success.

The appeal of a committee headed by E. A. Woodford, general manager of the California Fruit Growers' Exchange, to the traffic men in Chicago, is said to have been denied on the ground that the railroads have ceased to lobby in their own interests, and are unwilling to appear in behalf of the fruit growers.

EGGS WERE STRONGER THAN BULLETS

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Los Angeles, Cal., April 29.—Because they could not stand a bombardment of eggs from the hands of their intended victims, A. J. Williams and W. J. Wood today are at the city prison charged with robbery. The men are accused by C. E. Miller of confronting him with pistols on a dark street and ordering him to disgorge his valuables.

Miller was carrying a paper of eggs, and at the first words of his assailants he seized a shiny ovoid and smashed it full in the face of the would-be robber. Before the other could move he also received an egg, which bespattered his countenance, and both men abandoned thoughts of robbery and fled, pursued by Miller, who kept up the bombardment as long as his ammunition lasted.

Miller's cries brought a patrolman, and the alleged thugs were arrested.

GOLDFIELD FIGHTS TO GET FIGHT

Goldfield, Nev., April 29.—Every fight fan in Goldfield is soliciting funds today in an effort to raise a purse large enough to bring the Jeffries-Johnson fight for the heavyweight championship here during the coming congress which meets the last week in September. A purse of \$50,000 will be offered and if this is not large enough another demand will be made.

An offer of \$50,000 is bona fide. A mass meeting at which nearly 1000 fight fans were present was held last night, and it was definitely decided that every effort be made to secure the match. Forty thousand dollars has already been pledged and the entire \$50,000 will be deposited in the Johns Cook bank to assure the fight. It is said that the offer is made in good faith.
