CORVALLIS WRESTLERS THROW THE CHEMAWAS

For the first time in the history of Salem, a real wrestling contest was witnessed at the Grand opera house last night, before a fairly large crowd of enthusiasts. The wrestling was clean throughout, and the contestants strained and struggled with each other without the least sign of malice.

The Corvallis college won the best three out of four over the Chemawa wrestlers, but evidently, from the remarks of the professional mat artists who witnessed the bouts, the Chemawa contestants were just a little superior, owing to their endurance and heavy short build. Chemawa's champion, Harden, was thrown two straight by Sutton, of O. A. C., who showed wonderful skill and quickness. Gibson, of Corvallis, and Smoker, of Chemawa, being representatives of the featherweight class, put up a pretty exhibition of wrestling. Smoker throwing Gibson twice in close succession.

The bout which held the spectators breathless and pulling at the seats was in the 158-pound class, between Moses, of Chemawa, and Leedy, of O.

A. C. Both of these big muscled men were about on a par, and several minutes, when Moses got a hard hold to break on Leedy, with Leedy's shoulders in close proximity to the mat. The two contestants remained in this position for some time, Moses inquiring at intervals if Leedy would call the fall his (Moses') but the gritty wrestler from Corvallis refused to give up, and apparently taking Moses off his guard for an instant, made an excellent turn, and after rendering Moses' hold helpless, threw him in a short time.

Much credit was given Thompson in the 145-pound class. He showed exceptionally fast action and cleverness.

During the contest Referee King introduced Dan Sullivan, a fine big fellow, who has the reputation of being a world-beater in amateur wrestling. Sullivan told the audience that he has had a long desire to meet O'Connell in a bout for a purse of \$500, but up to the present time he has been unsuccessful in arranging a match with him.

TEDDY WILL SPEAK AT BERKELEY IN 1910

[United Press Leased Wire.] Berkeley, Cal., April 30.—Colonel Roosevelt will make his first public speech when he returns from Africa in the Greek theatre on the University of California campus, according to an announcement confirmed at the university today. He will reach this city in company with President Ben-

jamin Ide Wheeler early in August, 1910.

Roosevelt's promise to speak here is said to be the result of the long-standing friendship between Wheeler and the former president. Wheeler will go to Berlin early in September to deliver the annual series of "Roosevelt lectures." He will be joined there by Roosevelt upon the completion of his African trip, and together they will return to the United States, coming direct to this city.

LEFT MILLIONAIRE TO RUN PICTURE SHOW

[United Press Leased Wire.] Santa Barbara, Cal., April 30.—Local police and detectives from the Elms agency, Los Angeles and Boston, this morning raided the rooms of a cheap lodging house in this city and arrested H. Keno, who has been conducting a moving picture show here, and a woman said to be Mrs. Nettie E. Shaw, wife of James E. Shaw, president of the Interborough Railways of Boston.

The police took from the pair Eldridge, the 11-year-old son of Shaw, whom the mother had brought west when she left the home of her husband in the fashionable district of Boston nearly two years ago.

Keno had been chauffeur for Shaw. They came first to Pasadena, where Mrs. Shaw, assuming the name of her former chauffeur, known also as Mrs. Marble, maintained a splendid home on Arroyo drive. From Pasadena they came to Santa Barbara and Keno and Mrs. Shaw both found employment at the La Petite theatre, operating a 10-cent picture show. The woman sold tickets, sitting day and night in the box office.

The police and detectives laid a careful plan, after having fully established to their satisfaction the identity of the woman through Louis Field, a butler in Shaw's Boston home, who was brought out for the purpose by detectives in the employ of the husband.

The boy was taken in charge by Chief of Police Ross and taken to the chief's home. He said his name was Eldridge Shaw, although he had been called Eldridge Keno since coming west.

Shaw is said to be one of the wealthiest business men of Boston. He is also a club man and a sportsman. The father of Mrs. Shaw, H. S. Eldridge, is a millionaire brewer of Portsmouth, N. H.

The boy will be taken to Los Angeles this morning by the detectives. Mrs. Shaw says she will fight for the possession of her boy.

MAY SOLVE MYSTERY OF DIAMOND ROBBERY

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Francisco, April 30.—With the arrest of Kenneth Williams, who had in his possession diamonds worth \$3000, the police believe today that they have found a clue that may lead to a solution of the mystery that has surrounded the famous Lundy jewel robbery in this city in April, 1906. Williams was arrested by Detective Frank Lord of the local police. He refused to state how the jewels came into his possession despite the sweating to which he was subjected by the police. A clerk of the Lundy store identified the jewels found on Williams as among the ones stolen from the store, and the officers believe that Williams is in possession of facts that may result in the arrest of the robbers.

The robbery of the Lundy store was one of the most daring and cleverly planned in the police annals of San Francisco. Diamonds and other stones valued at \$48,000 were stolen, and no trace of the operators was ever found or any of the stolen gems recovered.

Williams was arrested while trying to dispose of some of the stolen goods in a Kearney street pawnshop. At the time of his arrest he told the officers that the jewels were purchased from the Crafon Wholesale Jewelry Company of Los Angeles. Today Lawrence Adams, said to be connected with the Crafon company, arrived at police headquarters and denied that the stones found in Williams' possession came from the Los Angeles store.

THINK THE TURKS NEED CONTRIBUTIONS

[United Press Leased Wire.] Boston, April 30.—Safety of Miss Rose Lambert and her American companions at Hadjin was reported today by W. W. Peet, treasurer of the Turkish missions with headquarters at Constantinople, who cabled to the foreign missions board, appealing for funds.

"The need of relief funds is increasing," says Peet. "There are 20,000 persons to feed at Adana alone. The hospitals and orphanages are crowded."

"We are feeding 4000 persons at Tarsus and a large number at Antioch and Marsh. Foodstuffs generally have been destroyed and \$20,000 is needed immediately."

"Marital law is preserving quiet at Adana and the Hadjin rioters have been put down. Missionaries and their property there are safe."

SMUGGLERS WORKED THE BIG FIRMS

[United Press Leased Wire.] Oakland, Cal., April 30.—That the firm of Abrahamson Brothers, of this city, one of the largest dry goods houses on the coast, was an innocent victim of the gigantic smuggling plot recently revealed in New York, became known here today.

Two weeks prior to the discovery that the smugglers had shipped goods to California in the name of Miss Nellie Grant, grand daughter of Ulysses S. Grant, a valuable consignment of goods arrived at the local customs house for Abrahamson Bros. The local firm expected no European shipments, and the goods were brought here under bond and examined. The case was found to contain much costly bric-a-brac and other dutiable matter, and the goods were returned to New York.

Following the exposure of the plot to get goods into the country by consigning shipments to well known people, the officers have arrived at the conclusion that the name of the local firm was used by the gang, and a report has been made to the New York officials.

GREAT SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION ENDS TODAY

In an interview with Mr. A. A. Morse, vice president of the State Sunday School Association, yesterday, he gave the representative of The Capital Journal the following interesting facts regarding the early history of the Sunday school work in this state:

"The program of the convention now in session here is headed 'The Twenty-fourth Annual Convention.' This naturally conveys the idea that the state association is 24 years old. The association is really over 30 years, and I think nearly 40 years old. Without data at hand I cannot give the exact figures. It was in the early seventies, I think, that the first Sunday school convention in the northwest was held in Portland pursuant to a call issued by Mr. J. K. Gill and two or three others. That convention included delegates from Washington as well as Oregon, for it was a territorial convention. The conventions following were not held yearly. In some instances several years elapsed between conventions, but for over 20 years conventions have been held annually. Interest at times was so lax that it seemed that the next step should be dissolution. The convention at Albany 10 years ago probably saw the Sunday school work in this state at a lower ebb than ever before or since. But it is always darkest just before dawn, and from that time to this the work has advanced, slowly at times, but with no backward step, until today our association stands on a firmer foundation than ever."

"The need of Sunday school work is growing on our people more and more. The motto 'All the School in Church and all the Church in the School' needs to be nailed over the door of every church and Sunday school room, not only for our own people now here, but for those now coming. Since March first over ten thousand settlers from the east and middle west have landed in Oregon through the Huntington gateway alone. Shall not provision be made for these also?"

BUSH WINS OUT IN GILBERT BANK CASE. OTHER DECISIONS

Three decisions were handed down by the supreme court this morning, being the last business the court will do before leaving for Pendleton to hold the May term of court in eastern Oregon.

The case of Roscoe C. Thomas, plaintiff, vs. A. T. Gilbert et al., defendants, the Schafer Piano Company, Tilton Ford, Ladd & Bush and others, appellants, the supreme court decided today as follows: On the grounds a pledge of property can purchase the same at a sale under a permanent lien, but in any event, if such sale is at a public auction, after notice, it is not void, but only voidable; the supreme court reversed a decree handed down by Circuit Judge Galloway for Marion county and dismissed the petition that the claims of the creditors of the defunct Gilbert Bros. bank be made a first lien on 105 shares of the stock of the National Bank of Moscow held by Ladd & Bush and sold at \$150 per share.

This is a suit brought by the original plaintiff, the late Tilton Ford, and that of the creditors of the Gilbert Bros., and the estate of A. T. Gilbert against the firm of Ladd & Bush, as partners, for an accounting chiefly with reference to 165 shares of the First National bank of Moscow, Idaho, alleged to have been transferred and held by Ladd & Bush (and other creditors) as collateral security for the repayment of certain indebtedness due the firm from estate of A. T. Gilbert and Gilbert Brothers. Gilbert was indebted to Bush in a large amount, and the lower court signed a conclusion of law to the effect that A. Bush was incapacitated to purchase such shares at the said sale and that the sale was void for illegality to a decree requiring A. Bush and A. N. Bush to immediately bring the shares into accounting and refund same.

In the case of State of Oregon, respondent, vs. Chas. W. Walton, appellant, appealed from the circuit court of Multnomah county, J. B. Cleland, judge, a petition for rehearing was denied today, the opinion being written per curiam.

J. B. Boothe, respondent, vs. The Farmers and Traders National Bank of La Grande, appellants, a motion to relax costs was allowed; opinion by Chief Justice Moore.
