CIRCUS RATHER PROSY

SOME GOOD STUNTS BUT THE CROWD WAS SMALL

Many a young kid awoke this morning after putting in one of the most strenuous days he ever had since the last circus nearly a year ago. Men, women and children were all there yesterday when Norris & Rowe opened their ticket window and notwithstanding the show was not a second ringing display, every one apparently enjoyed themselves. The crowd last night, however, was very small and the usual gaiety and excitement failed to materialize.

The most interesting performance of the evening, and the one which attracted the crowd's attention the most, was the bicycle riders. There were six of these artists on the stage at once, and the hair-raising turns they gave merited the loud applause from the audience. Wheels of every description were performed on, from those the size of an ordinary dinner plate to the one-wheel contrivance. One of the performers, evidently being the expert of the lot, wheeled into the center of the stage with a tandem and after raising the machine up on the hind wheel setting on the rear seat, he climbed up to the top still holding the bicycle on the hind wheel.

MUST ANSWER CHARGE OF EMBEZZLEMENT

Oakland, Cal., April 30.—F. H. Hilliker, accused of embezzlement in Washington, is on his way today to Spokane, in charge of deputy sheriffs. Hilliker is charged with the embezzlement of \$18,000 while agent of the Pacific Livestock Insurance Company of Spokane. It was in connection with this company's failure that State Insurance Commissioner Schively, of Washington, was indicted.

Claiming that he was merely an agent of the concern, and that he had no voice in its affairs, Hilliker declared before his departure that he was the victim of stockholders, who were trying to throw the responsibility of their losses upon the officials of the company.

BANK TELLER IS SHORT IN ACCOUNTS

Oakland, Cal., April 30.—Earl Bogardus, paying teller of the Bank of Germany, is in the city jail here today as a result of alleged defalcations at the bank during the past year.

At the jail Bogardus is said to have intimated that he had covered the operations of other men. Investigation shows no irregularities in his private life. He eloped a year ago with Gladys Adams, of Berkeley, and was married at San Rafael. Beside his wife, an aged mother is dependent upon him. He has always borne an excellent reputation.

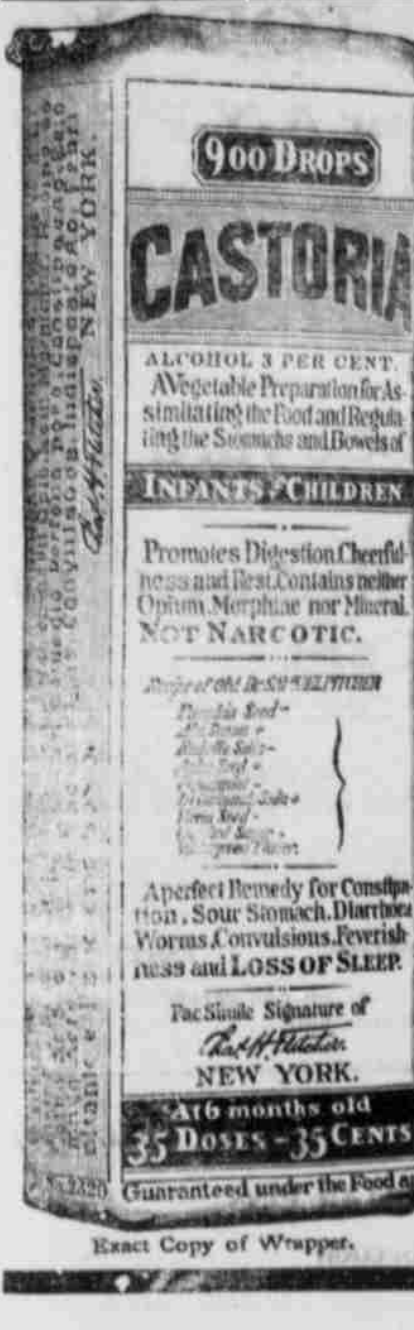
