FLOUR SENT TO CHINA SENT BACK TO AMERICA

Portland, April 30.—Flour which the Pacific coast millers were over-anxious to sell to the Orient early in the season at prices that did not in many instances pay for the cost of wheat and grinding, much less a profit to the miller, is actually being bought back by American flour men and will soon cross the Pacific by steamer and then go by rail to the east.

This flour will net the Oriental buyer-seller just about \$1.50 a barrel and as he does not have the funds for such a high priced article, is quite willing to let go and allow his native friends to again eat rice for awhile.

This is the first time in the history of Oriental flour shipments that flour sold to the Orient has been re-sold to American buyers and then resold again to eastern parties, each party concerned in the transaction securing handsome profits.

The local flour market shows more firmness and several of the smaller Willamette valley millers have advanced their quotations 20 cents a barrel during the past 48 hours. While the larger millers are still of the opinion that flour will sell higher after awhile they do not seem ready to advance their quotations at this time.

MOROCCANS GETTING ON THE WARPATH

[United Press Leased Wire.] Tangier, Morocco, April 30.—Tribesmen today pillaged the British and German post offices at Mequinez on the Sebu river, near Fez. Advances from Mogador, on the west coast of Morocco, stated that several Europeans were killed in that city by the belligerent tribesmen.

It is feared that the uprising will become general. Fez, Mogador and Mequinez have a numerous European population and much apprehension is felt for their safety.

SEAMEN'S UNION ORDERS STRIKE

[United Press Leased Wire.] Chicago, April 30.—The seamen's union today issued an order calling a strike at midnight tonight. The order applies to every branch of labor of lake vessels and is directed against the Lake Carriers' Association, which refused to recognize either union.

OREGON OMAN TO FRONT.

Miss R. Acker First Woman School Superintendent in Wisconsin.

Seaside, Or., April 30.—Miss Ruby Acker, niece of Josiah West, and who was bookkeeper some two years ago for J. West & Co., at Seaside, has attained prominence in Wisconsin by being the first woman elected to the office of county superintendent of schools in that state. Miss Acker is receiving many congratulatory letters and requests for her photograph and biography.

She was elected superintendent of Pon Du Lac county, Wisconsin, in the last election in a contest with a veteran of two terms in the office. Her campaign did not include stump speaking, but she devoted her energies, without losing a day's work in the high school, however, to writing personal letters to friends in the several voting precincts in the county. Miss Acker is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin and has spent several years in teaching in the public schools. She is the sole support of her foster mother, who is 85 years old.

The debaters are members of the Girls' Collegiate Debating League, and their subject will be "Should the Chinese Exclusion Be Extended to All Asiatics."

Word was received here last night of the death of George F. Shaw at the Good Samaritan hospital in Portland. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Shaw of 754 S Thirteenth street. Mr. Shaw went down to Portland last night and will return with the body this evening on the 6:45 train. Funeral notice will appear later.

The Ireton Subdivision—

The Wat-rs Bros Investment Co. has just purchased the O. Ireton farm about five miles south of Salem on the Liberty road. This farm is composed of about 243 acres, all clear land, except about seventy acres of timber. This farm will be immediately subdivided into five acre tracts. The corps of engineers expect to complete the work of subdividing this farm in about ten days. This Ireton farm is in the famous Liberty-Rosedale prune belt, and has several large springs of water and faces on two county roads. The soil is of the red loam character and especially suitable for fruit raising. 4-19-11

ALDRICH TALKS ABOUT TARIFF

Washington, April 30.—Senator Aldrich announced that the text of the maximum and minimum features of the tariff bill had been agreed upon by the senate finance committee today at a meeting following a consultation with President Taft and Secretary Wickersham, during which time they placed their approval upon the plan.

The new section provides that the minimum rates shall be the same as those in the Aldrich bill, and that the maximum rate shall be 25 per cent ad valorem, in addition to the rates specified in the tariff bill. It also provides a rate of five cents a pound on coffee and 10 cents a pound on tea, which are free in the bill.

The application of these higher duties is left to the discretion of the President. In case of discrimination against the exports of the United States by foreign countries he is authorized to issue a proclamation putting the maximum rates into effect. This proclamation may apply the maximum rates to the discriminating country as a whole or to a province or dependency which discriminates against this country. This is left to the discretion of the President.

When discrimination ceases the President is authorized to terminate the application of higher rates by proclamation.

The section says in part: "That from the 31st day of March, 1910, except as otherwise provided in this section there shall be levied, collected or paid on all articles when imported from any foreign country into the United States and any of its possessions, except the Philippine islands, the rates of duty prescribed by the schedules and paragraphs of the dutiable list in section one of this act and in addition thereto 25 per cent ad valorem."

The text then proceeds to explain the provision regarding the proclamation by the President in the event of discrimination by foreign countries.

Continuing the section says: "When the provisions of the general tariff of the United States shall be applicable to articles imported from any foreign country they shall be applicable to the products of such country, whether imported directly from the country of production or otherwise."

CAPTAIN HAINS SUFFERS COLLAPSE

Flushing, N. Y., April 30.—Captain Peter C. Hains, on trial for the murder of William A. Ennis, collapsed during today's session of the trial, and was carried from the court room by two deputies. It is stated that he is suffering from a complete nervous and mental breakdown. His cheeks are sunken and his hollow eyes are circled with deep black rings. Early today General Hains, father of the defendant, took the stand for cross-examination.

MADE IT LIVELY FOR THE GREEKS

Charley Thomas was brought before Justice of the Peace Daniel Webster this morning for his examination, and he made a plea of not guilty of shooting at a band of Greek workmen along the railroad near his place at Gates. Thomas told the court that he did not have a gun in his house at the time the alleged shooting took place, but, as a result of a close examination of the Greeks, who appeared to testify against Thomas, together with Constable Ira Hamilton testimony as to his investigation of the Greeks' house at Gates, through which several bullets had passed, evidently entering the side of the house facing Thomas' house, which stands only a short distance away. Thomas was bound over to the grand jury under \$500 bonds. In testifying one of the Greeks said he and his comrades were compelled to run into another room in order to escape the flying bullets, and that he looked out and saw Thomas in the doorway shooting.

FEDERAL COURT WILL TACKLE LAND FRAUDS

United States District Judge William H. Hunt arrived in Portland this morning. He will preside at sessions of the federal court today and probable tomorrow, when pending motions in various land fraud cases will be considered. Principal among these is the motion for a new trial in the case of John H. Hall, ex-United States attorney, who a year ago was convicted on an indictment charging conspiracy.

It is also possible that Judge Hunt will pronounce sentence on several of the convicted land fraud operators. Not until Judge Hunt arrives, however, will it be learned just what his mission is, aside from the fact that he is to hear an argument for a new trial in the Hall case. It is surmised he will be able to make some definite announcement respecting the trial of pending land fraud cases if Attorney General Wickersham is resolved to proceed with the prosecution of left over business originating under the administration of his predecessor.
