Board Reappointed-- The state board decided to reappoint the members of the state board of optometry yesterday afternoon. Lowe, Bar and Matlos are the reappointed ones.

Only a Small Blaze-- The fire department was called this morning to a house upon Thirteenth street, where a small conflagration was taking place. The chemical engine made a good run up Chemeketa street to Thirteenth, thence down Thirteenth to the North Mill creek, on which the house stood. The fire started from a defective flue and when the department arrived the roof was a mass of flames. The men with the chemical hose, however, soon put the fire out and the burned roof was the only damage done.

SANTIAM COUNTRY IS WIDE AWAKE

R. L. Swartz, foreman of the gang building the road into the Santiam mines, was in the city yesterday buying supplies. He says there are 25 men at work on the road, besides their line road machinery, and that the work will be completed in from 60 to 90 days, the weather being ideal for the work.

least 300 men are now investigating the section around Gold Creek, and the headwaters of the Little North Fork of the Santiam. Some important strikes have been made, and it is apparent that the whole section will boom this summer, and that the district will make a new record for Oregon.

It appears he had been sitting on the railroad ties resting along in the early hours of the morning and had fallen asleep and rolled back onto the rails. Had he been lying on a curve or had some train passed along during the night, there would have been another railroad tragedy in Marion county. Mr. Tramp was given a good talking to by the railroad men, and was told to keep off the right-of-way, if he could not keep from going to sleep, and he went on his way south, while the morning local came on to Salem.

McBride of the circuit court for the Fifth judicial district also resigned and was sworn in as a member of the supreme court this morning by Chief Justice Moore. Moore and McBride are both from the little town of St. Helens, Columbia county, which now has two members supreme court. U. Campbell of Oregon City now becomes judge in McBride's place.

Beginning on the first of May the carrier boys will collect for all papers sent out by carrier. Each boy will collect his own route and will receive as wages a proportion of each subscription he collects. The boys will collect only for one month. In other words, if your time expired April 15, the carrier will collect to May 15, and so on. If a subscriber is behind, say from Jan. 1, the carrier will collect no back subscriptions, but will collect from April 1 to May 1, or whatever the date might be. A collector will be around to collect for the subscription in arrears. The subscription price for the month is only 50c, and we particularly request that our subscribers have the money on hand when the boys come around with the receipts. This is a new system in Salem and we ask our subscribers to co-operate with us in establishing it, because we think it will be much more satisfactory to them. Each carrier will give a receipt for money collected and the time for which it pays.
