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HERE IS A STORY OF ONE MARRIED COUPLE

Oakland, Cal., May 5.—Tales of hardships endured during a weary passage with her husband as stow-aways aboard a sugar boat between Honolulu and Port Costa, Cal., were told in Justice Frank's court in this city by pretty Ethel Bathelbo, of San Leandro.

Weeping piteously and imploring the protection of the court, the young woman told of threats her husband had made against her life since she shared the perilous trip in the hold of the little sugar vessel, in order to remain at his side.

Mrs. Bathelbo refused to give her maiden name, but stated that her parents lived in this city. She said that soon after her marriage to Bathelbo they went to Honolulu. Becoming destitute there, her husband was unable to find employment, and they determined to hide in the hold of the sugar and return to this country.

Since their return Mrs. Bathelbo said her husband has abused her and threatened her life. She claims he has sold her personal belongings and even pawned her glasses.

OBJECTS TO PAYING ANY DISCOUNT

 Sacramento, Cal., May 5.—The office of the state controller has refused to allow a discount on the tax levy of \$20,404 against the Pullman Car Company for 1907, which the company claims was wrongfully assessed. A suit now pending over this levy was defeated in the federal and superior courts, and Chief Deputy Moulton has announced that the state will accept nothing short of the entire sum. The company tried to compromise for \$19,740.

The tax owed by the Pullman Co. for 1908 approximate the same amount as for the previous year, and is also unpaid.

WILL BUILD ROAD LAPWAI TO BUTTE

Butte, Mont., May 5.—Construction of a railroad from Butte to Lapwai Junction, Idaho, will be started immediately, according to an announcement made here today when articles of incorporation of the Montana Idaho & Pacific railway were placed on file. The new road will be 350 miles long, and is backed by the Harriman interests.

According to the provisions of the articles of incorporation, the new line will connect with the Oregon Short Line here and with the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company at Lapwai Junction. The country through which the road will run is very rich, but has no railway facilities at present.
