SHUTS UP OREGON AND OPENS IDAHO

[United Press Leased Wire.] Washington, May 5.—Withdrawing 242,000 acres of land in Oregon from entry today, Secretary Ballinger ordered 120,320 acres in Idaho thrown open.

In connection with the Malheur project in eastern Oregon the secretary ordered 148,000 acres withdrawn from everything except homestead entry.

Twenty-two thousand acres of the Dalles land district were withdrawn absolutely and will be used for a reservoir site for the John Day project.

In the Burns land district he also withdrew absolutely 16,000 acres in connection with the Harney project. For reservoir sites and investigation, 62,000 more acres were withdrawn in connection with the Deschutes project at Lakeview, Or.

The land restored is in the Blackfoot (Idaho) land district. It had been withdrawn in connection with the Minidoka project but was found to be unnecessary. This land will be open to settlement July 29 and to entry August 28.

LIBERTY BOOSTERS CONCLUDE HEARING BEFORE COMMISSION

LAWYER P.H. D'ARCY WAS PRESENTED WITH A GREAT WHITE ROSE BY FRANKLIN P. GRIFFITH A PORTLAND ATTORNEY

Within a few days the railroad commission will be prepared to hand down a decision in the hearing held Tuesday between the Liberty and Salem Heights boosters for an extended street car service south of the city.

Attorney D'Arcy called to the stand R. E. Lance, who testified regarding the number of houses, school children and working men residing in the territory. Mr. Lance stated that there were many young men and women who came to the city for their education. When asked by Attorney Griffith as to how many Salem residents would be likely to build and take up residence out there should cars run through that locality, he said many would only be too glad to make their home out there. Attorney Griffith informed the commission and others in attendance that as no one could compel the railroad company to carry passengers over such a proposed extension if the company is fulfilling their franchise agreement to the city limits, but they would be glad to accommodate the public by operating the extension service on a through rate of 5 cents if it can be so arranged.

B. S. Poisal, old of the large increase in the settlement of late years, and of how the pedestrian travel over the road in the district had grown, composed of workmen who are employed at different vocations in the city. Mr. Poisal when asked as to what he thought would be the future conditions stated it would develop into a small city within a short time if a good passenger service is put in operation over the extension which is now unused, and that he considered that locality in the same light as Portland people do the many high localities in and near that city such as Council Crest and Mount Scott.

Mrs. Crandall and Mrs. B. M. Woods were called on to testify regarding the present conditions and

gave a good description of the land and population.

Grove Hemaley testified in the same manner as the witnesses before and also said he thought the creators of the new addition located just beyond the cemetery had stolen the name from the Salem Heights further out, as when the new school house was erected at the end of the extension this name was adopted. J. D. Mann also said there were 52 families in the district, 12 without children; 13 widowers and a sprinkling of old maids. Wm. McGilchrist was called as the last witness. Mr. McGilchrist stated he was making no fight for the extension, although he would like very much to see it go through. Attorney D'Arcy asked Mr. McGilchrist by saying it was said he had stolen the name Salem Heights, and the good natured restaurant man admitted the charge by saying it was probably a true accusation.

Before the meeting adjourned Attorney D'Arcy made a direct and complimentary speech to Attorney Griffith. Mr. D'Arcy said while making a speech at the Salem Heights school house recently he told the good citizens that if Attorney Griffith handled the case for the railroad company an extension was sure to come, as that learned and considerate personage was a fair, progressive and good-looking citizen and would not turn a deaf ear to a good cause. Attorney Griffith then unplanned a beautiful big white rose he was wearing in his buttonhole and handed it to Mr. D'Arcy with his compliments. The commission and several witnesses then took a ride over the extension and were out there until 6 o'clock. The citizens of Liberty, Salem Heights and the nearer in real estate additions were very well pleased at the fair and impartial treatment they have received at the hands of the railroad commission.

A STORY OF LOVE AND AVARICE

[United Press Leased Wire.] San Francisco, May 5.—Monumental avarice on the part of her husband, threats of incarceration in a sanitarium for the insane, and a haze of hypnotic influence, under which she believed she was existing, are said to be the reasons for the beautiful Flowie Levy Schoenberg's return to her parents after three months' of married life with Ralph A. Schoenberg, of New York.

Mrs. Schoenberg is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. I. Levy, of this city and Burlington. She returned to her home under protection of men from the Pinkerton office.

Miss Levy and Schoenberg were married in New York last January, after a courtship which is said to have lasted 11 years, ever since the bride was a mere girl. According to

Mrs. Levy, it now appears that Schoenberg's stupendous greed was the actuating motive of this lengthy campaign.

Mrs. Levy said today that Schoenberg claimed that \$100,000 should come with his bride, and was not hesitant to express such an opinion. At the home of the couple in New York, it is said that Schoenberg threatened his wife with imprisonment in an asylum if she tried to communicate with her parents. She is said to believe that Schoenberg exercised over her some sort of occult influence, which he used to gain his ends.

"My daughter will not sue for divorce," said Mrs. Levy today. "If her husband were free, might he not place another girl in the same position he placed my daughter?"

YOUNG VANDERBILT EARNS SOME MONEY

London, May 5.—Demand for seats on Alfred G. Vanderbilt's two coaches running between London and Brighton has been so great since the service was started Monday that all of the space is booked today for the remainder of the week.

The coaches start simultaneously from opposite ends of the line each morning. Vanderbilt himself taking the box of the "Venture" and his manager, Charles Wilson, driving the "Viking." The distance is 52 miles

and the coaches meet half way between the two cities for luncheon.

Vanderbilt ran the Venture last summer and the experiment proved so popular that this year he provided himself with an extra coach, brought over 104 horses from Oakland and extended his season to August 1.

There was no panic but apprehension was expressed by the bears. May wheat opened at \$1.25 and within an hour had gone up to \$1.29 1/2.

Gossip says that J. Ogden Armour has been carrying on bull operations in the market for Patten during his absence and that now Patten will renew the fight harder than ever. Traders declared today that Patten's flight to escape reporters and threats of dynamite was a pretense and was part of a plan to cause a slump in the market.

ALEXANDER HURT FOR TOO MUCH TALKING

San Francisco, May 5.—Because Alexander Koretto resented an alleged slighting remark about Mary Schilfok, a pretty Russian girl, he lies in a local hospital today with a bullet in his shoulder. He is not expected to live.

According to Koretto's story, he was shot by Nicholas Dimitrio, who insulted the girl, after he had been ordered to leave the Schilfok home by her father.

Managers Heyser and Jerman of the local nine are real quiet about their new Butte man. Wonder if they intend to surprise McCormick.

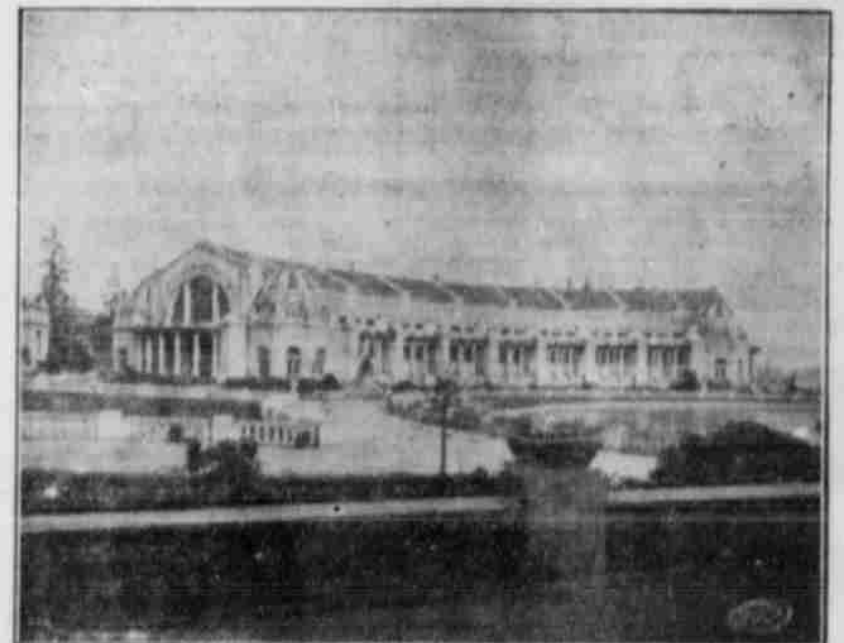

MANUFACTURERS BUILDING.

On the eastern side of Geyser Basin, at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, the handsome Manufacturers Building looks across the restless waters of the Cascades and the flashing foam of "Old Faithful," the reproduction of its namesake in Yellowstone National Park.

Its location is the most central of any of the exposition buildings, and its architectural design is especially fitting for the position it has been given. It was one of the first great exhibition palaces to be completed, and before the end of last year was ready for the reception of its vast collection of exhibits. It will house a magnificent assortment of the highest examples of man's ingenuity and invention, and within its walls will be gathered specimens of manufactured articles from the workshops of every nation of importance in the world.

It overlooks the finest of the formal gardens of the exposition, and its splendid line of pergolas, with their vine-covered columns and blossoming flowers, complete a restful and pleasing view. At no part of the grounds can be seen a more beautiful illuminating effect than is presented from the open pergolas during the late evening and early night. A million sparkling electric bulbs flash their white lights through the waters and, scattered throughout the greenery, hundreds of electrolights mingle their many hues with the riot of colors. Looking down the gentle slope of Rainier Avenue the floating craft of two lakes is brought into vision and adds the delights of a broad, light-sprinkled stretch of forest-enclosed waters to the whole effect.
