WELL KNOWN

PUGILIST DIES

Vancouver, B. C., May 6.—Guy D. Mowers, better known locally and on the sound as Bob Ritchie, a well known pugilist, is a suicide. He was seen sailing alone in a sloop in the North Arm yesterday and the crew o. a pleasure launch was astonished to see him deliberately upset the boat and sing out of sight. They hastened to the scene and just managed to revive him. He was taken ashore and when he recovered promised to take the next boat down to Vancouver. About two hours after, another party was amazed to see him standing on the brink of a precipice 200 feet high gesticulating and shouting. Coming closer to where he was, the party saw him shape his hands into a megaphone and heard him shout: "Good bye all." Then he poised as if for a dive and jumped onto the rocky rocks beneath.

His mangled body was brought to North Vancouver last night. He was a morman in the employ of the British Columbia Electric railway, and no cause for his suicide is known.

FINANCIAL SITUATION IS BETTER

New York, May 6.—Metal shares were in almost excited demand today in the stock market, and there were good advances in the leaders in consequence. Amalgamated Copper was, with American Smelter and U. S. Steel, the leader of the day. The advances were: Amalgamated 3 1/4; American Smelter, common, 1 1/2 points and United States Steel, preferred, 1 1/2. Steel common held an advance of 1/4 point at the closing.

The heavy advance in metals, especially copper shares was due to the heavy foreign shipment of metal. During the month of April more copper was shipped to foreign countries than during any period since January, 1908. The advance in steel shares was due to this, and to the expected advance in steel prices shortly.

Denver & Rio Grande gross earnings show an increase of \$360,000 for March.

Bank of England discount rate was unchanged for the day, and in the London market American shares were selling without important change.

Chicago, May 6.—Financial reports announced today show that the two Dominion government railroads operated during the year ending March 31 at a loss of \$60,726. This deficit was incurred in spite of the fact that there was no interest charges to be met, and no unusual expenditures for maintenance.

The Prince Edward Island road, 299 miles long, is responsible for the entire loss. The Intercolonial road, 1449 miles in length, was operated at an expense of \$9,157,436, while its earnings were \$9,173,595, leaving net earnings of \$16,123. The total operating expenses for the two roads was \$9,595,295, the earnings being \$9,534,569.

WHO WILL FURNISH SALEM FIREWOOD

Much complaint is being made that the woodyards in the city cannot fill orders. With the big overflow of slab and other wood from the Spaulding Logging Co. and their several teams delivering wood, it looks as though Salem should not be shy on firewood, but she is. PRESIDENT TAFT MAKES APPOINTMENTS TODAY

[United Press Leased Wire.] Washington, May 6.—Assistant United States Surgeon Rupert Blue, leader in the recent fight against bubonic plague in San Francisco, today was nominated by President Taft as surgeon of public health in the marine hospital service. Other assistant surgeons recommended by the President for similar promotions are Ezra K. Sprague, Charles H. Gardner and James H. Oakley.

The nomination, with those of Harry J. Humphreys, of Nevada, as United States marshal for the district of Nevada, and Second Lieutenant Allison B. Deane to first lieutenant of coast artillery, were sent to the senate today.

ILLEGITIMATE SON OF A FAMOUS COOK

San Francisco, May 6.—Demanding a portion of the \$25,000 estate of the late Auguste Artot, one of the famous French chefs of old San Francisco, Edward Averill, until today known as a second cousin of Edward H. Harriman, has filed a petition in the superior court calling for a petition. Averill's petition declares that he is an illegitimate child of the famous chef, who died last June, and reveals the fact that he is not the son of Isaac Seymour Averill, first cousin of Mrs. Harriman, and former partner of the railroad magnate in a Wall street brokerage business. The elder Averill is now a resident of this city, and is in the employ of the Southern Pacific railroad. Young Averill lives at Berkeley, and is store-keeper on the Pacific Mail liner Korea.

None of the Averills will discuss the suit, declaring that it is a private matter. Young Averill's position is brutally frank, however, and on portion of it reads:

"The petitioner resides in Berkeley, Alameda county, and was the illegitimate child of said decedent, Artot, but after his birth he was publicly acknowledged by said decedent as his own and received as such into the family of said decedent and otherwise treated as if he were a legitimate child; that said decedent, Artot, in his life, frequently acknowledged himself to be the father of the petitioner; that as such son of said decedent the petitioner is one of the heirs at law and next of kin of said decedent, and entitled to a distribution of a portion of his estate."

Artot's will left \$1,000 to the chef's daughter, Mrs. Florence Walsh and \$500 to his son, Charles Artot, both of whom are residents of New York. The residue is left to his widow, Marie Artot.

Evidently anticipating a contest, Artot inserted a clause in his will providing for the payment of \$5 to any heir not named in the document.

It is understood that Artot first met Mrs. Averill in 1884 in New York. She was then an unmarried girl of 18 who had recently graduated from a seminary at Philadelphia.

PLANTING MINES IN GOLDEN GATE

San Francisco, May 6.—Under the supervision of Captain Harley B. Ferguson, the government mine planting steamers Ringgold and Armistead next week will begin a series of mine planting experiments outside the Golden Gate. The Sixth Coast Artillery, under the command of Captain T. Q. Ashburn, has been detailed to assist the crews of the vessels.

The currents of the channel have rendered difficult the laying of mines outside the gate in the past years, permanency of location being the greatest difficulty to be surmounted. If this problem can be overcome, the mines the vessels will lay will be part of the permanent harbor defense.

After the work is completed the Ringgold will leave for Seattle, while the Armistead will be stationed at this port.

CURIOUS PERSONS EXCHANGE 40 SHOTS

San Jose, Cal., May 6.—Two curious persons, who refused to tell their names, are suffering today from slight bullet wounds received during a revolver battle under a bridge across Los Gatos creek near this city. George McAvoy and George O'Toole have been taken in charge by the police for their participation in the affair, and a search is being made for others who were involved.

The fight, which occurred about midnight, is believed to have been started by McAvoy, who escaped from the Agnew insane asylum. The five men who were under the bridge when the shooting started are thought to have been drinking. With the exception of the curious spectators, who hurried to the scene, no one was injured. About 40 shots were fired.

REAL ESTATE MAN WHO WAS CARELESS

Pasadena, Cal., May 6.—Carelessness in handling a package in which was wrapped his revolver, may cause F. Austin, a real estate man here, a leg.

Austin alighted from an interurban car this morning carrying the bundle in which was his revolver. Without thinking of its contents, he tossed the pack into the back of his automobile. There was a report and Austin fell to the ground with a bullet in his left leg. By a freak of fate the hose was shattered by the bullet, and at the hospital it was said that amputation of the limb may be necessary.
