Averell's petition declares that he is an illegitimate child of the famous chef, who died last June, and reveals the fact that he is not the son of Isaac Seymour Averell, first cousin of Mrs. Harri-man, and former partner of the rail-road magnate in a Wall street brok-erage business. The elder Averell is now a resident of this city, and is in the employ of the Southern Pa-cific railroad. Young Averell lives at Berkeley, and is store-keeper on the Pacific Mail liner Korea.
